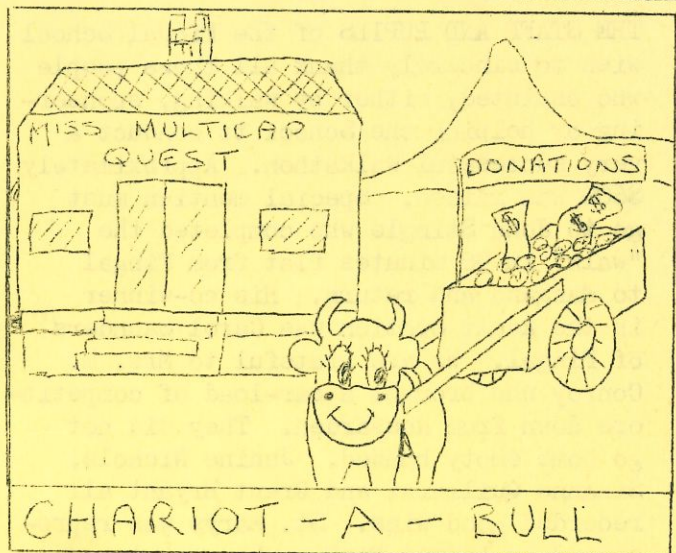

EDITORIAL

Skiing was a sport in Australia years before Switzerland had even heard of it, Australia too, has the second oldest ski club in the world. The Kiandra Ski Club established in the 1860's, soon after the first ski club was established in Norway. The Swedes learned to ski from the Lapps and Finns, who were the first to ski in Scandinavia. The Swedes probably learned first during the Viking era, when they were settling in the northern parts of their country, where farms and villages would have been isolated for a great part of the year without skis. It was in the old New South Wales gold-mining township of Kiandra that Australian skiing began. About 1860 a Norwegian miner, a relative of the famous explorer Amundsen, was among those who settled in this small Alpine mining township. It was he, together with some miners used to leave Kiandra each winter because the place was snowed in. As in Norway, its birth-place skiing in Australia began as a purely utilitarian method of getting about in snow covered country. But it was not long before competitions were held, and skiing became a sport. So the Kiandra Skiers formed a club and held races, even in the early 1860's. There is no question that Australia's vast snow fields are the equal of anything to be found in the world for perfect skiing conditions. In winter time they cover a combined area greater than the whole of Switzerland. This enormous snow region has an average altitude of 6000ft, the ideal height for skiing, and is free from major avalanches, glaciers and other hazards that are so common in the fields of Europe. Australian snowfields, from 5,000 to 7,000 feet are lower than most of those in the Americas and Europe, but they are in many ways superior and safer. Older geographically the mountains have smooth, curved sides and some of the slopes have 1,500 to 2000 feet of running. There are no ravines nor jagged ridges, few rocks and most of the skiing country is either above the timber line or very lightly wooded with snow gums. The weather too is more temperate than the snow country of other lands, and temperatures are rarely below zero. Unique to the Australian Alps is a strange type of grasshopper, which changes its colour according to the weather. On cold overcast days the insect



turns black, but on warm sunny days they become a bright blue. They turn olive black at night, and a blue grasshopper darkens if taken out of the sunshine and put in the shade. No such insects are found among the grasshoppers in any other part of the world. Scientists have traced the colour changes to movement of pigment granules deep in the insects "Skins". There are two colours, blue and brown, when its warm the blue granules rise up, and the brown sink deeper. When its cold the granules go the other way. These grasshoppers have no control over the colour changes, which is automatic and depends on temperature only. Change of light or of background have no effect if the temperature stays the same.

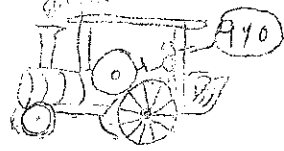

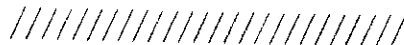

Dear Sir,

The St. Marys Bible Study Group is deeply concerned about the growing interest in occultism in our community. As a result we have prepared an article entitled "You and Your Stars". As a group of Christians we are asking that "Starprobe" be withdrawn from the Valley Voice. We feel that the people responsible for "Starprobe" write and print it in good faith but as our article points out, horoscopes are not as harmless as they may appear. Also interest in astrology can lead people into other forms of the occult. We pray the Valley Voice will continue to be a beneficial community venture and for God's guidance on the staff so they may wisely choose items for publication.

YOU AND YOUR STARS

The history of Astrology can be traced back over 5,000 years. The Babylonians were the first known civilization to use the stars as a means of fortune-telling. They mainly prophesized the fate of nations. The Greeks adopted these ideas and constructed the Zodiac from Babylonian mythology. They applied astrology for predicting the fate of individuals. The Assyrians not only studied the stars but incorporated the sun, moon and planets also. From these three cultures has emerged modern day astrology.

Astrology means "word of the stars". The dictionary definition says "astrology is the pseudo science of the effect of the stars etc. on human affairs". If it is a false science, why is it that in this scientific era astrology is booming. Is it relevant to modern society or is Mankind receding to a primitive level of mentality. Or is there a more sinister meaning for more and more people are being attracted to Occultism.

Today's generation is plagued by the threats of pollution, unrest and the constant stress of modern living. People feel insecure and afraid of

the future. Man has a basic need for a religion - something in which to believe, something to banish his fears, relieve his frustration and dispel his doubts.

Many people are disillusioned by the doctrines of many of the Churches which base their teachings of manmade traditions rather than the true teachings of Jesus. These deluded people then frequently become interested in the promises of the Horoscopes. They read their stars and often find that the prediction come true. They soon become Horoscope addicts putting their faith and trust in the stars. Of course some people read their horoscopes without being "hooked". They neither believe or disbelieve what they read but never the less they remain curiously interested.

Astrologists don't regard the stars and planets as great chunks of rock and gas but they believe that even over a distance of millions of miles these material bodies emit "spiritual" forces which influence the affairs of Mankind.

Although some horoscope predictions become reality it does not mean that astrology is right or good. Have you ever questioned or wondered why people have a compulsive fascination for the occult? What powers lie behind the "spiritual" forces that astrologist acknowledge?

Christians believe in a world under the influence of two spiritual powers - one is the power of God, the other is the power of Satan. Christians know horoscopes and all other forms of the occult are the works of Satan. The Bible tells us "No one may practice black magic, or call on the evil spirits for aid, or be a fortune teller, or be a serpent charmer, medium or wizard or call forth the spirits of the dead. Anyone doing these things is an object of horror and disgust to the Lord". (Deuteronomy 18 - 10-12). Isaiah also warns us not to put our trust in astrologers. "You have advisors by the ton - your astrologers and stargazers, who try to tell you what the future holds. But they are as useless as dried grass burning in the fire. They cannot even deliver themselves! You'll get no help from them at all. There is no fire to sit beside to make you warm". (47: 12-14 Living Bible).

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WOMEN'S HANDBOOK

The Woman's Shelter in Hobart recently published a handbook for women relating to Legal Aid, Custody of Children, Maintenance Personal Protection, Divorce, Property Settlement and where to get help. Publication and research was funded by an Australian Assistance Plan Grant from the Southern Regional Council.

The booklet was felt to be necessary for women because difficulty is often experienced by lack of knowledge of the Family Law Bill. Many people are unaware of what their rights are and have little knowledge of legal matters. The demand for the booklet has been great and there has already been a second printing. It is hoped to extend and revise it during the next year.

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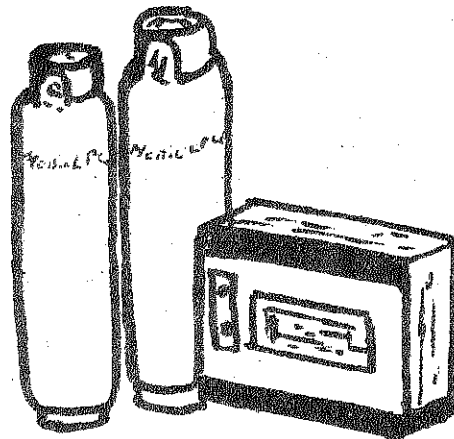


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GOOD WEEDS AND THEIR USES

Common weeds possess strong root system and go deep down into the sub-soil for minerals and other substances, because the minerals which plants require are usually abundant there. Being strong feeders the weed roots take up great quantities of the minerals and then bring them up to be stored in the stems and leaves so when the weeds are put into the compost heap, there the minerals are ready for the vegetable and flowers to have. Nature's constructive wild plants are the most condemned, yet are among the most valuable of all the fertility links. With their strong root system these "weeds" reach down into the sub-soils open them up and fiberize them, so the other agents of fertility can move down and broaden their fields of operation. There are many links in the chain of fertility to be found yet, we don't know them all, but the ones we do know, we can use, perhaps this will lead to other links. In improving land with weeds, every sprig of the weed growth should go back into the soil.

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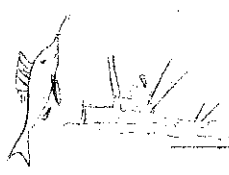
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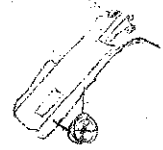

FISHING NEWS

Forthcoming events:- Tomorrow the Tasmanian Open Surf Championships, starting at noon on Swimcart Beach.. Sunday 15th May, Scamander Angling Club monthly contest at Wrinklers Beach starting at 11am, with the usual casting contest from 10am. Saturday 28th May, St.Helens Game Fishing Club cabaret at the Bay Side Inn and Sunday 29th May a Club Rally Day.

According to the second best fishing writer in Northern Tasmania, Swimcart contest should be a bonanza. The Club officials are advised to have two sets of scales on hand to cope with the expected queue of successful anglers and Max had better send out a truck from the factory. Anglers are reminded that it is not sporting just to wade out and catch fish with bare hands - a hook must be used. Last weekend saw a minor miracle - St.Helens Game fishing Club were able to conduct Rally Days on both Saturday and Sunday (after four previous cancellations). Fish were not plentiful but nine Bluefin were caught plus some stripped tuna. 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"DRUG SWAPPING"

The Pharmaceutical Society is concerned about the unauthorised use of legally acquired drugs. Pharmacists have been asked to alert the public to the dangers of "drug swapping". It involves the interchange of drugs between a patient under legitimate treatment from a medical practitioner and relatives or friends suffering from superficially similar complaints. The Society advises:

- Do not accept prescribed medicines from well-meaning neighbours or relatives who suffer from complaints which seem similar to your own. Only your doctor is in a position to know what treatment is best for you.
- Report any reaction or unusual effect you may experience from your prescribed medicine to your doctor or pharmacist who will advise you on its seriousness.
- Use your medicines strictly according to direction. If antibiotics or similar drugs for infection are prescribed always complete the course unless otherwise advised by your doctor.
- Guard your medicines from children. Brightly coloured tablets and mixtures can be a fatal attraction if left in an easily accessible place.
- Saving your old medicines can be a dangerous practice. Chemical changes and loss of potency will occur in many drugs that stored for long periods. Dispose of them safely as soon as your treatment is complete.

BOOK REVIEW

IT By Chris Aulich: Wild and Woolley(Pub)

"There's never been anything like IT": says the blurb on the inside cover of this first novel by Tasmanian writer, Chris Aulich. After the first paragraph I suspected this was true: at the end of the first chapter I was out there and didn't much care whether the claim was true or not. That's the sort of book IT is.

IT can, in fact, be all things to all people. Enclosed in the coming and going, fading and returning fantasy we are swept along, dream by dream, through a tunnel of dissolving mirrors and tantalizing imagery. We see but we cannot touch, because if we reach out to grasp, the shape and substance is lost on contact - like fairy-floss dissolves at the touch of the tongue. At times when the book itself seems to melt and change shape - once it was a book - now it is a dream - now it is a book again.

Therefore to categorize the book, would I fear, suffer a similar fate. Now historical (Gothic at least), now humorous now phantasmagorical. As I said, if you put the book down between readings, you could lose touch with reality.

Neither would I recommend IT as late night reading - or at early morning, sitting on the verandah in the sun - either way, the sun, or the "wings of dark night" could turn into IT and consume you.

Take my advice, reading IT sitting in a steel chair in a concrete room at high noon - or strapped in the "cavern" of your car in an empty parking lot on Sunday afternoon. Keep a small revolver loaded with silver bullets handy and don't tell anyone what the book is about until the year after next.

That's the way the mind trip is "...out beyond the frontier of the acid Gothic", where IT waits.
