SOLAR ENERGY

Solar energy has moved out of the home and into factories and farms. It is now not only able to heat the domestic water supply, but can operate simple machinery.

Manufacturing industries in Australia consume about one third of all oil used here, but solar energy can help reduce dependence on oil.

The first industrial usage of solar energy was in a soft drink factory and the second in a brewery. While these plants are run in conjunction with an oil-fired boiler, once the input from the solar heat generating system is sufficiently high, the boiler automatically cuts off. Solar ponds developed in Israel 30 years ago are now being introduced into Australia. These ponds work by filling them with a number of layers of water containing different densities of salt. At the bottom the solution is brine, but in ascending layers the proportion of salt decreases and the water at the top is almost fresh. Sunlight penetrates to the bottom where heat is captured and held by the salt layers. A pond can provide enough heat to generate power to operate a 150 kilowatt generator.

The pond also acts as a heat reservoir and heat stored in summer can be used to heat a swimming pool in winter.

Solar technological developments in Australia include a solar milk pasteuriser in commercial use in Victoria and a solar powered single-stand shearing unit. In the United States of America a radio station is now fully solar powered.

Cadbury Schweppes Claremont factory has recently installed the largest solar energy heater in Tasmania. It is hoped that it will be able to power at least half a 14kw hot water system. Solar energy is catching on in Australia, but still has a long way to go. The number of households using solar energy increases each year, but

these really only scratch the surface of the potential for solar power for the production of heat and electricity in the long term.

The drawbacks of solar energy are that it is of low density and available only at intermittent intervals. Its future will depend both on the availability and price of alternative fuels, and on continued successful research by the Australian National Research Development and Demonstration Council together with the C.S.I.R.O.

INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE TREE

It cannot be stressed enough just how important trees are to humanity. They bring the rain, and use up the carbon dioxide released by the cities. Trees, by the action of sunlight on green foliage absorb carbon dioxide and release oxygen, thereby being the most important asset this world has. There is evidence that the carbon dioxide is increasing, but our trees are decreasing, what will be the eventual effect on our oxygen balance?

The most sensible approach is for us to plant a tree. If every householder planted one tree, what a difference that would make. It has been estimated that 12-15 trees in a street will change the air, restoring it to its natural healthy condition in about 5-6 hours. In Tasmania we are very lucky, we still have lots of trees, so we have good air and rain.

The tree is a powerful water pump too, it sucks upwards with force of thousands of pounds per square inch, gallons of water from quite deep in the earth, in fact as deep as its roots go. They also help with erosion; planted along creeks on the banks they help to keep it in place. Apart from their importance to mankind, trees are essential to the animal kingdom also, birds too.

THIS IS TASMANIA EAST COAST
(extract from this booklet)

The 408 kilometre Tasman Highway covers the whole of the east coast between Launceston and Hobart. From Launceston, the road heads north easterly to Scottsdale and then climbs into mountains covered with tall forests and numerous mines where rich tin deposits are worked from alluvial beds.

Over the Weldborough Pass, the road descends to Pyengana where a side road leads off to the picturesque St. Columbia Falls, and then on to St. Helens, the main East Coast town and first of many attractions on the East Coast proper. South of St. Helens the road follows a magnificent surf beach to Scamander, a popular and fast growing resort on the Scamander River. Then follows a spectacular drive up the St. Marys Pass into the town of St. Marys, as the head of coal rich Fingal Valley. The road then leads down the serpentine Elephant Pass, through tall stands of eucalypts with tantalizing glimpses of the ocean seen at every turn. At sea level again, the road hugs the coast as far as Bicheno which is renowned for its fishing. Bicheno is also a convenient centre from which to visit Coles Bay and the Freycinet National Park where 300 metre high hills of solid red granite provide a vivid backdrop to sweeping beaches and precipitous headlands.

At Swansea, 43 kilometres south of Bicheno, the road again meets the coast and follows it through green pastures, between sea and mountains, to Triabunna on Prosser Bay. Triabunna is home port for a big commercial fishing fleet, but it is also achieving fame for its giant woodchip industry using timber from nearby forests.

FOR
ELDERLY CITIZENS.

Though there has been an obvious lack of news so far this year about the activities of the various Elderly Citizens groups in the valley, this is definitely to the contrary. All groups have been very busy.

On Monday, March 29, the Fingal Valley welfare committee for the Senior Citizens, held its Annual General meeting at the St. Marys R.S.L. Institute.

It was pleasing to see so many interested persons present.

The guest speaker was Mrs Prue Hazelwood, Recreation Officer, Division of Recreation, who spoke on the theme, "Helping Yourself and others".

Here are some excerpts from her talk.-

"I speak on a wide topic, basically 'helping yourselves and others'.

"Three score years and ten is the bible concept. Insurance companies limit life insurance and your retirement to 60 - 65, but usually there is more time than this, and free time to most, is a new concept.

"Many of you had little free time in your younger years, and so many people can never get through these retiring years. Some find the days very long, very long indeed.

"Elderly people find simple things in life the most worthwhile, such as walking, and chatting. Three quarters of their time is spent in the garden, in fact gardens are one of the most frequented places, and T.V. is accounting for about 40 hours of the week.

"Socializing is a most important thing, such as picnics and drives, age is no barrier to fun.

"Many however, carry their working habits into retirement.

"It is best to get together, people with common interests. Use 'bits and pieces' from community activities, suitable to older people, and if you wish to try them out, contact the Division of Recreation, who will do their utmost to bring these interests and activities to fruition.

"There is a school for Senior Citizens in High Street, Launceston, with a whole range of interesting subjects. The first time this year, there were 60 people present, discussing an assorted array of things. There may be some people who do not like clubs, but would mix with their own age group".

Mrs Hazelwood screened the film, R.S.V.P. (Retired Senior Voluntary Program), which was illustrative of her talk. The querulous old gentleman in the film, is now demonstrating and presenting people, especially children, to press and printing at the museum.

It was noted on the wall displays Mrs Hazelwood put up, lists of possible interests and activities.

PRESS STATEMENT - Max Burr

The State Minister for Main Roads, Mr. Braid has been asked to classify the Four Mile Creek road at St. Marys as a tourist road.

The federal member for Wilmot, Mr. Burr said that he had written to Mr. Braid asking for the reclassification as that would then allow the Federal Government to make a contribution for upgrading.

The recommendation follows a meeting last week between the St. Helens Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Burr and the new State member for Wilmot, Mr. Salter.

The Four Mile Creek road extends from Falmouth to Chain of Lagoons along the coastline and would allow the St. Marys Pass and the Elephant Pass to be bypassed.

Mr. Burr said that those dangerous sections of the Tasman Highway were deterring tour coach operators and other private tourists from visiting the Portland area.

It was hoped that an improved route for the Tasman Highway would encourage many more people to visit St. Helens and make St. Helens a stop-over during their itinerary on the East Coast.

The Four Mile Creek road extends for about 15 miles from Falmouth to Chain of Lagoons and at present about half of that distance is formed with a gravel surface. The reclassification and upgrading of the road would be an encouragement for tourists and provide safer road conditions for all visitors to the East Coast.

The Museum specialises in the scientific, historical and artistic aspects of Tasmania. It holds unique collections of Tasmanian animals, including the rare (or extinct) Tasmanian Tiger. Rare examples of Tasmanian aboriginal weapons, rock engravings and other products are displayed. A large exhibition of early fire-arms and a complete Chinese Joss House, from a pioneering mining settlement, are featured.

The extensive art galleries are renowned for their displays of colonial art, including John Glover and many other early painters. There are also collections of contemporary art and craft, costume and decorative art.

Temporary art exhibitions, films, concerts and other special functions are arranged during the year. The Museum has a modern cinema/theatrette and a Zeiss Planetarium in which the moon, planets and stars of the solar system are described. Admission Free.
