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PLAY IT SAFE ON THE WATER THIS SUMMER

Each year dozens of people die and hundreds more are injured in boating mishaps on Australian waterways.

The tragedy is that many boating accidents could be avoided if people would take the time and effort to observe a few basic safety rules.

The mere fact of owning a boat does not automatically ensure that one has the knowledge and ability to go boating with safety.

The new boat owner must understand the attributes and limitations of his boat and ensure it is well maintained and properly equipped. He should know his boat from stem to stern and have a thorough knowledge of the engines or sails and of the lifesaving and firefighting appliances carried.

Be sure your boat carries a range of safety equipment including life-jackets and other gear appropriate to its size, type and the waters on which it will be used. Also, make sure that this equipment is stored correctly and that you know how to use it.

Remember that many items deteriorate when exposed to sea water, sea atmosphere, oil and petrol and with infrequent usage. Check your safety equipment regularly.

Marine authorities have found that lifejackets are often not used, even when they are available. Children and non-swimmers should always wear life-jackets or buoyancy aids particularly in small craft, and when the weather is bad they should be worn by all on board.

Not only your safety but also that of others, depends on a sound working knowledge of the Collision Regulations sometimes known as the "Rules of the Road at sea". You will find them listed in the book 'Safety for Small Craft'.

To plot a safe course, familiarise yourself with the area in which you want to go boating and note the dangers particularly the weather, depth of water and state of tide.

Before setting off on a boating trip check the weather forecast and the existing conditions for the area from every available source; the weather bureau, volunteer coast guards or people who have just returned from the area. Learn how to recognise

cloud and wind patterns and how best to react before the warnings become dangerous changes.

Be sure you have enough food, water and fuel with a margin to allow for unforeseen delays. Equally important, tell a relative or responsible friend the proposed plan for the outing and your expected time of arrival or return. Make sure you adhere to this plan.

There are a number of ways of indicating distress and all boat operators should know how to signal or indicate an emergency and also to recognise when help is required by others.

Do not attempt to board the craft if it has water in it-it could be unstable. Bail it out first.

Step into the centre of the boat, on the bottom boards, and sit down promptly but gently. Do not move unnecessarily and do not stand up.

Always distribute the weight of the crew plus gear so that the vessel remains level and upright. Do not overload the boat.

No matter what size the craft, do not take it outside sheltered waters until you have had considerable experience in handling it in a variety of conditions.

Learn all you can of local weather conditions and be certain of your local geography such as the position of any bars across the entrance to a waterway.

Naturally, the ability to act quickly and correctly in emergencies can be gained only by practical experience backed up by reading or expert instruction.

However, if you follow these basic rules you should be well on your way to avoiding trouble or perhaps becoming the subject of one of the dozens of major search-and-rescue operations carried out off Australia's coast each year.

Much valuable information and often the first actual experience on the water can be gained by joining classes run by an organisation such as the Australian Volunteer Coast Guard or by one of the reputable boating schools.

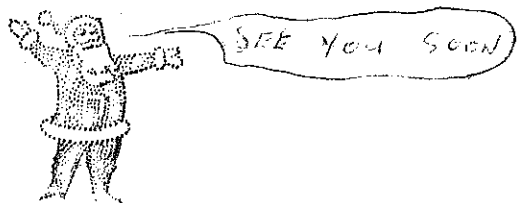
