FREEDOM OF INFORMATION

WHAT IS FREEDOM OF INFORMATION?

The freedom of Information Act gives you the right of access to most documents held by government agencies, such as the Department of Social Security. You do not have to have a reason if you want to see any documents, but Social Security does have to give you an explanation if you are not given what you want.

You can ask for documents held by Social Security. Under the Freedom of Information Act a "document" can be a piece of paper, computer print-out, map, photograph or audio-visual record. You can ask to see the document and ask for a copy of it.

A proof of identity check may be made, and if so you will be told what forms of proof are acceptable. To make a request for information in writing, you need a special form supplied by Social Security.

Usually, if you are getting a pension, benefit or allowance, you will not have to pay to see your own documents. In some cases Social Security can charge for requests. If you cannot afford to pay, you can ask for the charge to be reduced.

More often than not you cannot see another's documents, unless that person has authorised you to see them. Usually, only written authorisation is acceptable. The staff will advise you about this.

When you have filled in the form you should hand it in or post it to any Social Security office. You will get back a receipt on the bottom of the form to show that your request has been received. Social Security must reply to your request within 60 days.

If you are not happy with the decision about your request you can ask to have it reviewed, or if you have not received a reply to your request within 60 days you can appeal. When you have seen your own file you can ask to have any details about you changed if you think they are incorrect.

If you have trouble with the English language, you can speak to an interpreter through the Telephone Interpreter Service.

TASMANIA ANNOUNCES GRANTS

More than \$1.1million in State funds is to be made available to Tasmania's municipal councils for Bicentennial projects and celebrations. The State Government will provide the grants on a dollar-for-dollar matched funding basis.

Announcing the State's local government grants scheme, Mr Brendan Lyons, the Minister responsible for Bicentennial celebrations, said that the State Government contribution was in addition to Commonwealth funding of \$500,000 for Bicentennial celebrations and activities.

He said that councils throughout Tasmania would receive a grant of \$5000, plus \$2 per head of population. The final amount will be conditional on the grants being matched by the councils. The matching funds would have to be in addition to any funds committed by the councils to matched Commonwealth grants.

The allocations would have to be spent on permanent projects and on celebratory activities which will be subject to State Government approval.

The allocations will be paid in two instalments, the first in September 1986, and the second in September 1987.

CHILDREN IN SPORT:

The following article is an extract from School Sport, a publication of the Australian Schools Sport Council.

"Every child has the right to participate in appropriate sport. Appropriate sport is defined as sport which is commensurate with the physical, mental and social development of the child.

Most children who participate in sport today are those who have a high level of skill and play in a situation where a great deal of emphasis is placed upon competition. This situation excludes many children who would like to participate but who do not enjoy sport in its present format.

The Australian Sports Commission believes that every boy and girl, by the end of Primary school, regardless of age, skill level or disability, should have mastered the basic motor skills of walking, running, throwing, catching, jumping, hitting and kicking. The acquisition of these skills is based upon a sound physical education and reinforced by participation in a range of sporting activities.

To further this aim, the Commission has developed a Children in Sport Program. The Program is aimed at providing all children with the opportunity to participate in appropriate sporting activities.

Such activities should focus on participation, skill development and fun and include sports that have modified rules and/or equipment, accommodate a variety of skill levels, provide opportunity for boys and girls to play on the same team, and accommodate children with disabilities.

The Commission has developed an action plan which in part proposes a school sports program incorporating an award scheme. This program is aimed at helping to bring about substantial changes in the quality and variety of school sport programs, some of which could take place in lunch breaks or after school, utilising school/community links. A part of the program is an award scheme based on participation in a number of different sports, officiating, knowledge of injury prevention and skills assessment as related to the sports played".

PRESS RELEASE FROM MAX BURR

"The Federal Government's pilot scheme to help the elderly unemployed is a realistic approach to a soul destroying problem," Mr. Burr MHR for Lyons said today.

"The elderly make up 13 percent of the unemployed and, when losing a job at 55 in this day and age, they become unemployable.

"The tragedy is that even the CES has to admit that it cannot help in job supply and the elderly have to search daily for work in order to report fortnightly to the social security officers that they have tried to get work." Mr. Burr said that a pilot scheme being run in the Wollongong - Dapto area could come up with the answer to this fruitless task.

"It is a six month pilot study and will involve about 1,000 older unemployed.

"The idea is to relax the fortnightly reporting for the elderly who, in many cases are unfit to obtain work.
