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AMBULANCE NEWS

Our Annual meeting was held on 1st July in the Recreation room at the St. Marys District Hospital. The Executive Director, Mr Charles Ridlick and Mrs Von Stieglitz, (Northern Administrator) and also Mrs Lois Towers were in attendance.

Mr Ridlick addressed the meeting on how the ambulance funding operated. He stated that since the Red Cross received the subsidy from the Government everything was running smoothly. With an all time record of at least \$10,000 that kept Red Cross going for the year ending June '85.

Mr Ridlick thanked the local committee for their help and time during the past year in making the ambulance run smoothly. He also thanked Mr Keith Cook (Secretary, St. Marys Hospital) for his time and help for getting the charging system underway.

On Sunday 30th June, the ambulance was taken to Hobart for an assessment. Max Britton, Mrs Pat Burgess and myself took it down and we were shown around the new ambulance headquarters. They also had their mechanic there, and he checked our ambulance over thoroughly. The report hasn't arrived as yet, but there are a few jobs that have to be done to it. E.G. Holey carburettor fitted, oil seals fixed and also an oil seal, plus a good tune up.

Max had a good time with Brian, (the mechanic) and I think Max put him on the right track as well. The ambulance service in Hobart seems to think that this present ambulance is suitable for another two or three years, but we are determined to fight for a replacement vehicle as soon as possible, perhaps sometime in the financial year of 85/86. But we will keep pushing, and even if we have to do some fund-raising we are determined to get a replacement.

Mr Whitehead (Duty Officer) has offered drivers and nursing staff a training course in Hobart over a weekend, whenever we feel like going down. It is hoped that this course will take place sometime next year. The drivers and Hospital staff who wish to do this course will go on the Friday night and return home late

Sunday after the course is finished, so we will be organising this course sometime after the new year.

On Sunday 7th July a few of us met and held a mock accident up Irishtown Road, with the co-operation of Constable Ken Maroney, with Max and Bruce, Pat Burgess and her girls as patients. This mock accident was held to promote Red Cross in Tasmania. Photos were taken of the accident and sent to Hobart to be developed. Then they will be sent to Red Cross in Melbourne, in which an International Red Cross book is being made and will be distributed around the world.

The ambulance, fire brigade and also the police are going to meet to try and see if they can combine in a mock accident somewhere. If this is so, we hope to be able to have about three a year. This is to enable all services to be up to standards in case of a disaster.

We are in the process of trying to form a ladies committee, so fund-raising can go ahead for things that we would like to purchase for the ambulance.

We hope another bulletin will be put out in two months, in fact every two months there will be one put out to keep people of this district informed of what the ambulance service is doing.

ST. MARYS DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

CENTENARY HOLIDAY - FRIDAY, 26th JULY:

The Minister for Education has now approved a full day holiday for all schools and colleges on Friday, 26th July to mark the centenary of state education in Tasmania.

Originally a half-day holiday been planned but because of the difficulties of providing for the transport of students in city schools, a full-day holiday has now been granted.

COUNTRY EDUCATION POST GRADE 10 SCHOLARSHIPS:

During the last two years students from St. Marys and St. Helens District High Schools who continue with their formal education beyond Grade 10 have been granted an amount of money through Country Education to assist with their education costs during their first year of post-secondary education.

The amount is determined by dividing a sum of money by the number of eligible students. This year, each student received \$160. This is significant financial assistance and, hopefully, extra incentive for students to continue with their education.

At this stage, no absolute guarantee can be given that a similar amount will be available for 1986 Grade 11 students but it is considered most likely that it will be available.

This scholarship scheme originated out of a submission from the Fingal Valley Resource Group to the local Country Education Committee, a committee of teachers and parents, chaired by Mr. Jim Napier.

During October, the committee will consider submissions for projects to be funded in 1986. Community groups will be given the opportunity to prepare submissions before that time.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT CENTENARY:

As part of these celebrations, the school is putting together a display of text books, photographs, school records and memorabilia. Parents and friends are invited to contribute to the display by lending to the school any items of interest to do with schools in Tasmania.

GARDEN NOTES

ROSES

Time for rose pruning again. This does not involve sets of complicated rules, just appreciation of why it is necessary. The aims of pruning are merely to relieve the bush of old surplus wood, thus making way for young, healthy growth, plus we shorten back some of the new growth, so as to allow lower canes to grow and be sturdier. A little confidence is needed to try your hand at pruning, remember practice makes perfect, and bad

pruning this year may mean a few less flowers or excessive twiggy growth, but these can easily be corrected next pruning season. Old wood that should be removed will be barky, rigid and often a brownish grey colour, whereas the new canes are smooth and plump. The older branches usually are long, thin twiggy growth, cut them as close to the crown of the plant as possible, or just above new younger cane. Any dead or old unproductive wood should be cut as close as possible to where it emerges. It is wise to snip off the top of new laterals, forcing more growth to come to the lower sturdier stem encouraging a more even flow of sap to the rest of the bush. Pruning will give you a healthier neater looking rose and many more flowers.

EAST COAST PIONEERS

In 1820 Commissioner Bigge was sent out to report on conditions prevailing in Australia under the Governorship of Col. Lachlan Macquarie. He went from one of Tasmania to the other, and enquired why the East Coast was such a neglected area. In his report he said "Governor Sorell sent individuals for the purpose of examining country between Port Dalrymple (Tamar) and the eastern coast, especially that part called Swan Port". Henry Rice was the man chosen to do the survey. He had already been over the area a year earlier, but without much observation. Rice had a small farm at 'Coal River' (where Richmond now is) and also worked for Lieut. Gunning of the 73rd Regt. In his survey we read:- 29th Dec. 1819. "Leaving Big Swan Port river we made for the lower end of the Shoutens, the ground very hilly and stony and some valleys of very good land, but to no extent. We passed three small runs of water and came to a large lagoon (Apsley Marsh), near twenty miles round and a fine river running through part of it, which runs into Big Swan Port, we then took our course toward the main Tier which bounds the main ocean. On 31 Dec. we left Stony Boat Harbour and travelled along the main coast as far as Oak Point toward Patrick's Head. The land was very good on the sea coast for many miles, but all forest land. We fell in with runs of water and several beautiful lagoons. On Jan 2nd 1820 we noticed the land on the sea coast all the way to Patrick's Head runs very good and to the north it runs into large marshes and brushy plains to a great extent. We traced this part of the country for four or five days to find the best entrance into the "Break of Day Plains. When we crossed the main tier three miles north of Pat. Head a beautiful river that runs into the New River brought us into the Break of Day Plains. (New River old name for South Eek River)

"I hope some of the \$215,000 being granted to the State, to assist with basic learning in primary schools, will flow to the rural schools," Mr Max Burr, MHR for Lyons said today.

Mr Burr was commenting on the Federal Government grant to the Education Department of Tasmania which was part of the Basic Learning in Primary Schools Program.

"The program aims at spending nearly \$7 million throughout Australia to assist children in reading, writing, speaking and mathematical skills in years 1 to 3.

"The funding is to be used in improving teachers' skills, evaluating the needs in special areas and creating pilot programs through which disadvantaged children can be assisted."

Mr Burr said that it was his experience to find that the disadvantaged child in the remote areas of the state was the one to be overlooked in these surveys and that greater emphasis was placed on the urban areas.

"While agreeing that money had to be spent to the best advantage, I see no reason why a child should suffer a deficiency in basic learning simply because he or she lived in the country," he said.
