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COUNTRY AREAS PROGRAM —

COUNTRY EDUCATION

Recently, a newsletter explaining the aims and functions of the St. Marys-St. Helens Country Education Committee was distributed to all families of children attending the schools in this area- Bicheno, Fingal, Avoca, Rossarden, Mathinna Primary, St. Marys and St. Helens District High Schools and to local organisations.

The Country Areas Program is a program funded by the Federal Government to:-

- * help alleviate the substantial and persistent disadvantage of many country children and their families which stems from restricted access to social, cultural and educational activities and services;

- * develop better ways of delivering educational services to students in country schools;

- * provide a framework within which school communities and country people can work co-operatively to improve education opportunities for country children.

The area committee has representatives from each school (parents and teachers) with an independent chairman, Mr Jim Napier.

This committee considers submissions and facilitates the development of projects after they have been approved by the State Committee.

In 1983, \$35,000 was allocated, in 1984 the figure was \$46,000 and in 1985 the allocation was \$50,000.

Projects funded over the past three years have included Speech Pathology Aides, Outdoor Education Equipment, Travel, Computer Awareness, Language Extension, Science Enrichment, Interstate Student Exchange, Video Camera Packs, Widening Students'

Horizons, Special Education, Laminating and Binding Facilities, Post Grade 10 Scholarship, Subsidised travel expenses for piano and organ tuition and music camps for the formation of an East Coast Orchestra. In 1984 and 1985 the Fingal Valley Community Resource Group and the Lions Clubs of St. Helens and St. Marys were successful with submissions to help students going on to further education and to participate in an interstate student exchange.

Submissions for 1986 will be advertised for, on August 29th and it is hoped that Community Organisations or individuals will consider ways of funding projects to benefit the children of our area.

The functions of Area Committees are to:-

- * identify educational needs of children aged between 5 and 16 who live in the area;

- * propose to the State Committee area-based programs to meet those needs and to facilitate the development of such programs;

- * call for and consider submissions for inclusion in each program;

- * monitor the progress of each project until completion or until the whole program comes to an end; and

- * provide regular reports on projects to the State Committee.

ADVANCE AUSTRALIA COMMITTEE.

On the 7th August at 2p.m., a unique ceremony will be conducted by the Premier, the Hon. Robin Gray. Mr. Gray will be asked to unlock the impressive front entrance door of the Tasmanian Hotel building in Fingal, to symbolize the creation of new life for the historic 1850's building; the restoration of which will be the catalyst for the brave new plans for the entire East Coast region. Mr. Peter Viney, a direct descendant of Daniel Pestell, the original builder of the hotel, will unveil a sign on behalf of the family, to signify the beginning of the 3 year restoration project. Operations actually commenced on the old Tasmanian Hotel in mid May, 1985 with a band of energetic volunteers who set themselves the task of the massive clean up. The horrendous damage to every conceivable area of the building and its once extensive gardens by wanton vandalism is a sad reflection on community pride and respect for a dwindling heritage jewel. Until, that is, a small community of willing workers decided it was time for action to save this dignified

building from the inevitable dozer brigade. Cynics and tunnel visionaries will insist that the project to restore and revitalize such a building for multi purposes in this East Coast Region is a waste of taxpayers money - an attitude all too prevalent in our Tasmanian Community which is screaming for ideas to encourage tourism, generate jobs and provide stimulus for some grass roots action.

On completion in 1988, in conjunction with Bicentennial celebrations, this project will indeed be a fine example of the power of positive thinking and provide motivation for renewed regional development within the state. To coincide with the launching of the Tasmanian Hotel Project, an East Coast Development plan will be formally presented to each councillor within the municipalities of Portland Fingal, Glamorgan and Spring Bay. One of the most important aspects of the plan, if accepted, will be the creation of the quarterly or half yearly conference of regional community leaders to enable greater communication between groups. This should provide a forum for co-ordination of ideas and new development on the East Coast. It will also present the wider community with information and greater access through a suggested regional bulletin produced after each conference with editorial comment from each community sector. The key to success of this essentially local government initiative will be if a promotions and development officer is employed by four municipalities on a shared time basis. Seen as a radical new idea, for smaller council bodies in Tasmania, the co-ordinating role this specialist position will require could easily have the potential for quietening and indeed dispelling cries of amalgamation for some country municipalities. This East Coast Community could well be heading for Bicentennial year in top gear and provide some excellent motivation for others if the proposals currently in hand are approached with a good deal of positive action.

"ST. MARYS STATE SCHOOL - Mr. Herbert James Smith, teacher.

The school house is an old fashioned building, divided into two fairly large rooms, and the teacher's residence is a detached four-roomed cottage standing in its own grounds.

The number of scholars on the roll is ninety-five, and the average daily attendance is about eighty.

When Mr. Smith took charge of the school, about seven years ago, the number of pupils on the roll was only about sixty, so that good progress has been made, and it is evident that Mr. Smith's abilities as a teacher are recognised, and that confidence is felt in the general management of the school."

Dear Ms. Bishop,

Thank you for your advice regarding an application for CEP funding by the Municipality of Fingal, your REF. TCJ 000136.

I support the application by the Council for \$65,430.00 with which to employ ten people for thirteen weeks by improving the roadworks on the Upper Esk Road.

I am advised that the planned programme is in the Mathinna area and includes grading, drainage, gravelling and sealing for approximately 2.25 km. It is essential that the Committee give serious consideration to this application as the planned road works are a continuation of work commenced in 1984 with the aid of previous JOLOR allocations. This application will guarantee that the previous work is complemented and provides the local community with an asset that will improve the transport facilities of a rural area.

Extracts from the HOSPITAL ANNUAL REPORT (Chairman - Denzil Casbault).

Hospital activity showed an increase over the previous year and is closer now to historical levels of use. The 1984 year was peculiarly quiet. Of course, most inpatient activity is as a Nursing Home for the Community's elderly. Recognising this continuing role of the hospital, the Board has requested a review of bed classifications. It's aim, supported by your Department of Health Services, is to reclassify 12 beds as Nursing Home Beds. Such a change would give a small financial advantage to the State under present funding arrangements and more accurately reflect a significant portion of the hospital's work.

The Community Health Nursing Service continued it's growth, responding to increasing awareness and demand. A re-assessment of the visiting roster permitted a 15% increase in visits made at little extra cost.

The Home Care Service also had increased activity, managing at the same time to work slightly within the approved budget for the service.

Each year I find more reason to praise the hardworking Hospital Auxiliary members. In 1984/85, this most dedicated band of workers provided funds to furnish a complete ward, donated a video tape recorder, cushions, chairs and patients gifts.

This Board, the hospital and the community have good cause to be extremely grateful to the Auxiliary.

Red Cross maintains its ambulance service for the district. For the first time, Red Cross now charges the Board fees, equivalent to Tasmanian Ambulance Service charges, so placing the ambulance on a more commercial footing. The dedication and service provided by Mr. Max Britton as permanent day driver is highly commended.

I place on record this Board's appreciation of his unselfish and willing assistance at all times. To the rostered drivers too the Board extends it's thanks.

Neville Feake deserves thanks too for his work, interest and effort in maintaining the Red Cross Branch in St. Marys.

The Thursday "day hospital" continues to operate effectively. Credit for this under-valued service is due to many people to whom I express gratitude.

The entertainment group who visit so regularly provide a great boost to the inpatient and daypatients on these days.

AUSTRALIA'S FASTEST GROWING INDOOR SPORT

It began as recently as 1978, developed in Western Australia by Dennis Lillee and Graham Monaghan.

It spread quickly to the eastern states, and is so popular that there are nearly 300 centres operating already.

It's also played in New Zealand, South Africa, and England, and a world championship is in the offing.

It's fast, furious and fun, suitable for both sexes and nearly all ages.

It's indoor cricket, Australia's fastest growing sport.

Indoor cricket is played in a court 30 metres by 11 metres, enclosed in a net. The game is short, only 90 minutes long, and its popularity is at least partly due to the fact that every player gets a chance to bat and bowl. Each team has eight players, each of whom bats for four overs and bowls for two. If a player gets out before the end of his batting stint, the umpire deducts five runs from his team's score and the player bats on regardless. You can be bowled out, caught off all nets except the back net (six runs), stumped, or run out.

Runs are scored by hitting the ball into the net and by running with your partner for bonus runs.

The main advantages that contribute to indoor cricket's growing popularity include:

- * it is a real team game in which every player has a vital role
- * every player - champion or novice - participates equally in batting, bowling, and fielding.
- * it is played with a softball, eliminating the need for pads and reducing the risk of serious injury
- * it promotes physical fitness and sharpens reflexes
- * men, women, and children can play and find the game easy to master
- * It is played by men's, women's, children's and mixed teams
- * all equipment, as well as umpires and scorers, is supplied by the cricket centre.

As with all forms of sport, indoor cricket players are advised to do warmup exercises before starting to play in order to reduce the risk of injury. The Tasmanian Physiotherapy Sports Group is currently working on the prevention and immediate management of injury for indoor cricket players
