### Careers Awareness Programme:

The St. Marys Chamber of Commerce will be conducting a three stage Careers Awareness and Education Programme on 11th May, 4th July and 19th September.

Students from Grades 10-12 will be participating in a presentation morning on 11th May. This involves a comprehensive discussion on individual presentation and grooming for interviews, how to prepare resumes for job prospects and general preparation for the workforce. On 4th July, Grades 8-12 will be involved in the second stage of this programme.

This will include both students and parents who will have the opportunity to attend a career workshop situation where they will be able to gain some knowledge and information on the type of employment best suited to them. Information will also be available on the subjects required for each particular type of job.

Stage 3 of this programme concludes on 19th September for Grades 10-12 when individual students will be interviewed by employer panels.

This whole programme is basically designed to encourage and prepare students for the workforce and to make them aware of the opportunities available in various job prospects.

Dear Editor,

The rising level of teenage violence should be of concern to everyone. The first demand of all civilised people is to live in peace and security with other civilised people.

All is not lost yet, but the trend must be reversed quickly if we are to maintain an ordered and civilised society where people can live in peace and security.

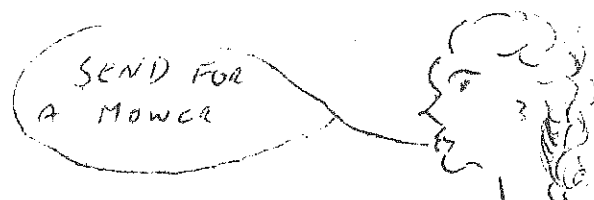
### MIXED DOUBLES
