## NEW TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

On Wednesday March 21, a new State-of-the-Art A.X.E. telephone exchange was commissioned at Parnella, a rural computer controlled facility that should bring the highest possible standard of service to the Northeast Coast.

This A.X.E. will be a terminal exchange for more than 170 customers and will also serve as the minor switching centre for hundreds of others in Stieglitz, Pyengana and Binalong Bay.

Besides offering its users greater reliability, the new exchange also gives customers such optional extras as call control and call diversion.

Looking ahead, Telecom anticipate that demand for Telecommunications Services will grow in the Northeast. To keep up with the growth, a six Kilometre-long optical fibre was also commissioned, linking the new exchange with St. Helens. This marks the first use of this miracle of science anywhere in Northeastern Tasmania.

During the opening ceremony, Mr John Hepburn, Northern District Manager, presented the Principle Officer in Charge, Mr Kevin Faulkner, with a badge to commemorate his 35 years service with Telecom, praising his service to the community and his work with Telecom. Congratulations Kevin.

It should not surprise anyone that Telecom is working to improve the standards of Telecommunications in the Tasmanian heartland, away from the two major metropolitan areas. Tasmania has led the rest of the nation in modernising services outside the cities. We were the first state to replace all the manual exchanges with automated facilities. The mobile network coverage here is among the most extensive anywhere in Australia. Our State's standard of rural communications is second to none.

Another small Tasmanian district is part of the Optical fibre network. The towns of Sheffield and Barrington are now linked by optical fibre.

## FOR THE NORTHEAST COAST

Of course their situation is special, They are hosting the world rowing championships this year and are expecting literally hundreds of sporting journalists and spectators to descend upon Barrington, and every one of them will be wanting to make calls..lots of them.

By 1992, the North will be linked to the South by optical fibre. This will provide the State with standby links with the North and South and hence the mainland, with the most up to date technology available.

This decade will also see the introduction of an Australian telecommunications breakthrough that is literally the envy of the world.

Its called Q.P.S.X. and in simple terms, what it does is make it much easier to transmit vast amounts of computer data through optical fibre, very, very fast.

So before too long Q.P.S.X. may help you decide which of 50 T.V. signals you would like to view. It could make it possible for you to "call up" the front page of any newspaper in the world. Doctors at very small regional hospitals could tap into the giant memory banks of huge medical centres half-way around the globe. This Q.P.S.X. which Telecom is helping develop, can do all that and more, and the world is adopting it as standard.

To explain about optical fibre. Imagine a single pair of pure glass fibres, joined into perfectly formed strands some 200 kilometres long. Then imagine up to eight thousand telephone calls or faxes, each coded into incredibly short bursts of light. Now imagine all of those messages being sent through that single pair of fibres at the same time. Each of those fibres, by the way, is about the width of a single hair on your head.

Telecom has come a long way since the old copper wire days. Soon the optical fibre network will extend along the East Coast and across the North from Launceston to Wynyard.

## TUTOR SUPPORT SCHEME

In all schools there are groups of students who are sceptical about the purpose and relevance of school work. Often these students prove to be indifferent and uninterested in the activities presented in the classroom, occasionally individuals do have a disruptive effect and disturb the work of others.

Like all schools St. Marys District High School has such a group and in an attempt to convince such students that school work has value out of school, a programme begun in 1989 is continuing at an expanded level in 1990.

Quite simply it entails the placing of individual students in work situations for one day a week for as long as employers feel they can adequately make use of them. It is hoped that this regular attendance in a work situation will achieve at least two objectives:

a). recognition that some aspects of the school programme deserve close attention and hard work,

b). to develop a mature, responsible and considerate approach towards work and towards those with whom they work.

At present 5 boys are participating in the programme and it is hoped that this will increase to as many as 11 in the near future.

NEWS RELEASE.

Tasmanian author and historian, REG. A. WATSON, is wanting to hear from descendants of Private ELLIOT HENRY BAILEY, who was killed in the Boer War in 1900.

Private Bailey hailed, he believes from Avoca, and was the son of Thomas H. Bailey of Avoca. Private Bailey is buried in South Africa.

Reg. A. Watson's current project is the locating of the resting places of all Tasmanians who died either from accidents, disease, the bullet of suicide in the Boer War, There are 33 of them.

Mr. Watson said that Private Bailey was buried where he was killed, in a remote place of East Transvaal, but unfortunately the grave is now lost.

"My contacts in South Africa are still searching and authorities from the National Monuments Council state that when the grave has been re-discovered, they intend to place a commemorative plaque on it. "I think it is important for Bailey's descendants to know

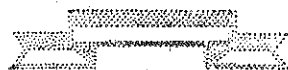
of developments," Mr. Watson said.

Mr. Watson restated that as yet Private Bailey's final resting place has not yet be re-located, but descendants may like to participate by contacting the South African authorities and perhaps thank them for their efforts and intentions.
