HELP FOR PENSIONERS OPENING BANK ACCOUNTS

New identification procedures came into effect in February this year under the Cash Transaction Reports Act involves a points system for people in opening new accounts.

The new requirements have made it difficult for some pensioners to meet this 100 point test.

Pensioners and beneficiaries will now be provided with a letter from the Department of Social Security to make it easier to open new bank accounts.

The Department's "letter of introduction", issued to clients who show that they cannot satisfy a financial institution's identification requirements, has been allocated the full 100 points.

This will certainly help clients who are homeless or living in remote country areas and need to open accounts to allow for the direct credit of Social Security payments.

Any pensioner or beneficiary requiring such a letter should contact their nearest Social Security Office.

INJURY IN SPORT.

Sporting injuries do occur, despite all the effort and planning designed to prevent them. Many factors are involved. An athlete in peak physical fitness can slip or fall or trip, perhaps in poor weather. Someone just started on an exercise programme can inadvertently strain a muscle even when using indoor equipment. When warm up and flexibility exercises are ignored, all kinds of trouble can result.

When an injury occurs, it is important to follow a plan of action.

Outside of the field of professional athletics and very competitive sporting activities, most injuries the average person is likely to see or experience are those related to muscle, tendons, ligaments and skin. These are known as soft tissue injuries.

The key to minimising recovery time is to attend to the injury as quickly as possible.

The letters ICE stand for ice, compression and elevation and this is a widely used management technique for soft tissue injury.

* Ice (or a cold pack) is used to minimise the inflow of fluids to the injured site, and this controls the swelling.

* Compression is achieved with a heavyweight crepe bandage and this is used over the ice pack.

* Elevation will ensure that blood must work against gravity to reach the injured area.

Although there are numerous products available which are designed to help with the prevention and treatment of sport and exercise related injuries, always seek the advice of a qualified medical practitioner when you are in doubt, or if the injury appears to be of a serious nature.

THE HOBART DECLARATION ON SCHOOLING

The State, Territory and Commonwealth Ministers of Education met as the 60th Australian Education Council in Hobart, 14-16 April, 1989, chaired by the Minister for Education in Tasmania, Hon Peter Rae, MHA. Conscious that the schooling of Australia's children is the foundation on which to build our future as a nation, Council agreed to act jointly to assist Australian schools in meeting the challenges of our times. In reaching agreement to address the following areas of common concern, the State, Territory and Commonwealth Ministers of Education made an historic commitment to improving Australian Schooling within a framework of national collaboration.

Common and Agreed National Goals for Schooling in Australia

Ten national goals for Schooling will, for the first time, provide a framework for co-operation between Schools, States and Territories and the Commonwealth. The goals are intended to assist schools and systems to develop specific objectives and strategies, particularly in the areas of curriculum and assessment.

The Agreed National Goals for Schooling include the following aims:

1. To provide an excellent education for all young people, being one which develops their talents and capacities to full potential and is relevant to the social, cultural and economic needs of the nation.
2. To enable all students to achieve high standards of learning and to develop self-confidence, optimism, high self-esteem, respect for others, and achievement of personal excellence.
3. To Promote equality of educational opportunities, and to provide for groups with special learning requirements.
4. To respond to the current and emerging economic and social needs of the nation, and to provide those skills which will allow students maximum flexibility and adaptability in their future employment and other aspects of life.
5. To provide a foundation for further education and training in terms of knowledge and skills, respect for learning and positive attitudes for long-life education.

6. To develop in students:
 - the skills of English literacy, including skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing;
 - skills of numeracy, and other mathematical skills;
 - skills of analysis and problem solving;
 - skills of information processing and computing;
 - an understanding of the role of science and technology in society, together with scientific and technological skills;
 - a knowledge and appreciation of Australia's historical and geographic context;
 - a knowledge of languages other than English;
 - an appreciation and understanding of, and confidence to participate in, the creative arts,
 - an understanding of, and concern for, balanced development and the global environment; and
 - a capacity to exercise judgement in matters of morality, ethics and social justice.
7. To develop knowledge, skills, attitudes and values which will enable students to participate as active and informed citizens in our democratic Australian society within an international context.
8. To provide students with an understanding and respect for our cultural heritage including the particular cultural background of Aboriginal and ethnic groups.
9. To provide for the physical development and personal health and fitness of students, and for the creative use of leisure time.
10. To provide appropriate career education and knowledge of the world of work, including an understanding of the nature and place of work in our society.

Providing a sound basis for a collaborative effort to enhance Australian Schooling, the agreed national goals will be reviewed from time to time, in response to the changing needs of Australian society.

This declaration represents a major advance in developing a national collaborative approach to schooling in Australia.

MEDIA RELEASE

CUSTOMER SERVICE SHOULD BE PARAMOUNT

Grave concern that the new emphasis on commercialism and profitability by Australia Post was resulting in a cut back of customer services was expressed by Senator Watson (Lib, Tas) at a recent Senate Committee Hearing in Melbourne.

The cessation and reduction of postal services to remote areas within Tasmania and the closure or abandonment of post office box sites within Tasmanian towns was raised.

"Australia Post has a monopoly on the delivery of post in Tasmania and the rest of Australia. Therefore, it has certain social responsibilities. The same economic considerations or criteria applied to the delivery of post in a large city area should not apply to rural and isolated areas," Senator Watson said.

"In a monopoly, service to all customers must be paramount."

Australia Post has recently ceased postal delivery to the Polana region of Flinders Island and the Killiecrankie area of Flinders Island is also to be affected in the future. Senator Watson has asked the Secretary of Australia Post for an explanation and a list of all other areas to be affected within Tasmania and the rest of Australia.
