COUNCIL INFORMATION

BUILDING AND PLANNING

The regulations governing development in the Municipality are due to change considerably during the forthcoming year with the proposed introduction of the Fingal Planning Scheme and adoption of the Building Code of Australia in place of the Tasmanian Building Regulations. Since failure to secure Council approval could result in legal action and considerable expense, property owners are advised to contact the Council Office before starting any building, plumbing, or other development work. Council staff will be pleased to offer assistance and advice.

PINK PAMPAS

Pink Pampas has become a big problem in Tasmania and is threatening forests and other areas. If you have pink pampas it should be removed. The Forestry Commission office at Fingal will be happy to advise you what should be done. They can be contacted by phoning 742 102.

FIRE HAZARDS

Property owners are also asked to ensure their land does not cause a fire hazard. Please clear away long grass, overgrown vegetation and rubbish before it dries out and becomes a potential fire danger.

STRAY DOGS

Following the introduction of the Dog Control in 1988, harsh

penalties are provided where owners allow their dogs to stray. Due to the increasing number of complaints Council is receiving about stray dogs, offending owners may find themselves facing heavy fines.

BARKING DOGS

Council is also receiving an increasing number of complaints about barking dogs. Please ensure that your dog is not an offender. If Council receives a complaint about barking dogs, it is obliged to take action.

RUBBISH TIPS

In recognition of the large size of our Municipality and the wide spread of residential areas, Council currently operates 11 tips which is more than any other Council in Tasmania. The cost of operating these tips is very high but you can help by ensuring that you place your rubbish in the trench and not beside the trench on the road access - this will reduce operating costs which ultimately affects your rates. And please remember, tips must not be set fire to - it causes pollution and it is an offence punishable by a fine.

FREE IMMUNISATION FOR YOUR CHILD

There are a number of diseases your child could contact but which can be prevented by immunisation. This immunisation is FREE. Contact your Doctor or Council.

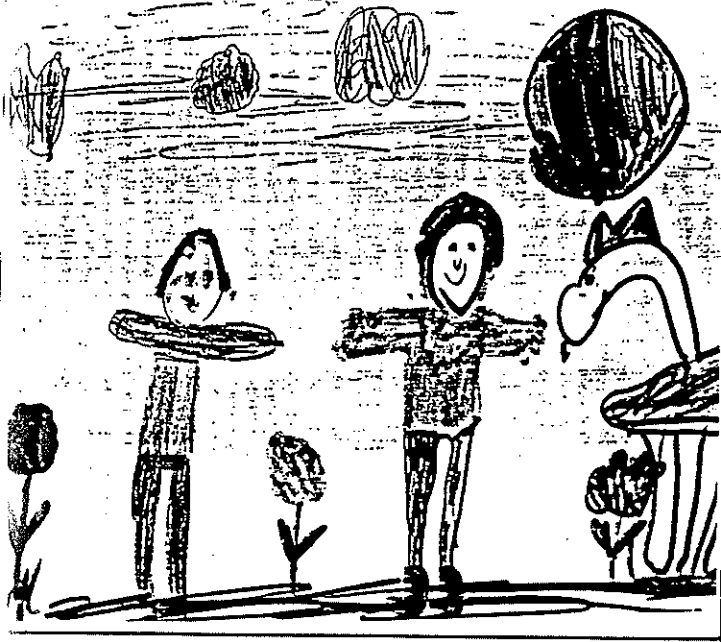

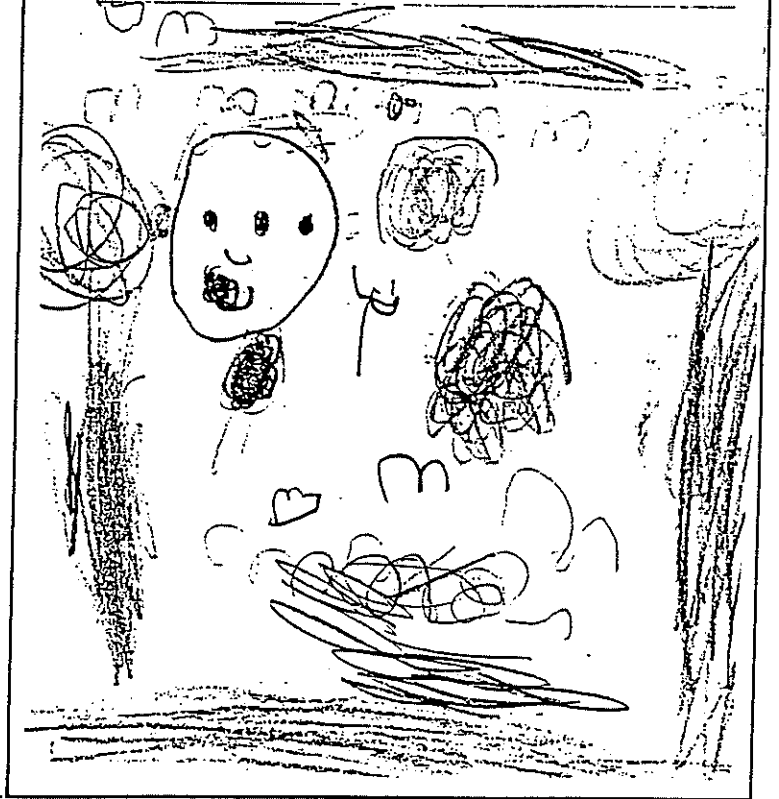

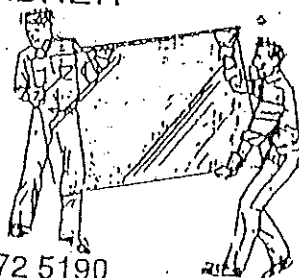

GOVERNMENT TAXES ON BANK ACCOUNTS

Last year the Federal Government made a change to its financial relations with the States. It transferred the Bank Account Debit Tax, which had been a Commonwealth tax since its commencement, to the States from 1 December 1990. It left it up to the States as to whether to continue the tax.

Outlined below is a brief description of the taxes which have been levied on bank accounts and presently apply.

Bank Accounts Debit Tax (BAD)

This tax is now a State tax and is referred to as a Cheque tax. It applies to debits on accounts which have a cheque drawing facility and is calculated on the following basis:

\$1	-	\$99	15c on each withdrawal
\$100	-	\$499	35c on each withdrawal
\$500	-	\$4999	75c on each withdrawal
\$5000	-	\$9999	\$1.50 on each withdrawal
Over \$10,000			\$2.00 on each withdrawal

Financial Institutions Duty (FID)

The FID has always been a State Government tax. It applies to all receipts of financial institutions. The standard rate is calculated by charging so many cents per \$100 of deposit. The level varies between States. The standard rates are:

- 2.5c per \$100 is levied by the Northern Territory
- 6c per \$100 is levied by Vic, N.S.W., TASMANIA & W.A.
- 10c per \$100 (as of 1.11.90) is levied by S.A.
- No FID tax is levied by Queensland.

State Debit Tax

This is a State Government tax which became effective from 20th December 1983 and is levied at the rate of 15c for every withdrawal.

A 'balance sheet' of job losses on the East Coast and Fingal Valley over the past two years told a horrific story, it was claimed this week.

Liberal Member for Lyons, Mr. Graeme Page, said the Portland, Fingal, Glamorgan and Spring Bay Municipalities all had seen alarming increases in the number of people out of work.

"The 'no-growth' policies of the Greens, combined with lack of activity by the Field Government has had a frightening impact on jobs and unemployment.

"At St. Helens, there was a 29.6 per cent increase in the number of people receiving unemployment benefits in the June quarter alone.

"There are now 184 people in the Portland Municipality forced to rely on a fortnightly dole cheque.

"The increase over the past two years under Labor and the Greens has been a massive 76.9 per cent.

"At Fingal, in the 12 months to June the increase in Unemployment was 41 per cent and among 15-18 year olds, 100 per cent.

"At Glamorgan, there has been a 53 per cent increase in unemployment under Labor and the Greens and at Spring Bay, the increase has been 71.2 per cent.

"There are now 706 people receiving unemployment benefits on the East Coast and in the Fingal Valley. 282 at Fingal, 184 at Portland, 127 at Glamorgan and 113 at Spring Bay.

"That is an increase of 239 or 51.2 per cent over the past two years - significantly higher than the average for the state as a whole."

Mr. Page said there was no confidence, no development and no capital works spending on the East Coast.

"The no growth and no hope policies of the Government and the Greens are exemplified by the locking up of half of Tasmania's known coal reserves in the Douglas Apsley National Park.

This Government would rather pay to prevent jobs than to create them.

"The Government actually paid Huon Forest Products \$3.4 million not to proceed with their project, and is now doing nothing to crank up the rich Southern Forests potential since the closure of APM.

"On the East Coast, there is not enough Government backing to speed up aquaculture developments and the Triabunna Chip Mill could go out to try to sell bigger, long-term contracts if only the Government allowed it to.

"In the North-West, the Pulp Mill will take years to eventuate because of a drawn-out bureaucratic approvals procedure and other companies who want to have a go such as the Kauri Timber Company can't get Government backing for a new chip mill."

Mr. Page said jobs and Government disinterest and inaction were twin issues that had to be tackled and overcome by strong positive leadership.

"Stopping major projects and preventing others getting off the ground is a disastrous approach which must end and until it does, The East Coast and Fingal Valley suffer along with everyone else," he added.
