A 'ROAD' BY ANY OTHER NAME

Judging by the amount of tourist vehicles already using the "Link-Road", when it is officially opened, St. Marys and the Fingal Valley in general, stand to lose a considerable amount of the tourist dollar.

A few weeks ago, it was said the Fingal Council could not think of a name for the old road up the Elephant Pass and St. Marys Pass once the "Link Road" officially becomes the Tasman Highway, and would only be calling it the St. Marys Road.

What about Elephant Pass, Scenic Route to St. Marys? Gateway to the Fingal Valley? St. Marys Pass Scenic Route? Food; Petrol; Accommodation; Youth Hostel; Population Etc!

Most tourists would not know just by looking at a map, that St. Marys is a reasonably sized town, and a well placed and informative sign at both ends of the Passes would help divert curious tourists to venture our way.

It's up to the State Government and Local Council to help keep our community alive.

We also have some very nice Parks throughout the Valley, which have been developed by the Forestry Commission, and from having constant contact with tourists, I know that they are often looking for something different, other than the normal tourist attractions.

Maybe we 'inlanders' are not growing at a fast rate like the coastal towns, but tourists often comment on the fact that we have a nice little town, and it is up to us to keep them visiting.

We would welcome comments from the general public in the Municipality

of Fingal, and from the Council members on this subject.

Let's see a sign that makes a statement concerning our lovely valley!

OFFICIAL? or NON-OFFICIAL?

If St. Marys Post Office (among others) is downgraded to a non-official status as suggested in newspaper reports over the last few weeks, would St. Marys lose any services?

We understand Passport interviews can only be carried out at Official Offices. Does this mean travelling to Launceston for an interview? How about a tax file number? Does the same apply?

If the existing office is closed do we line up in the supermarket or the take-away to do our banking? What about paying our Housing Dept. rent - our Hydro and Telecom bills? Will we still get a mail delivery?

Will we be offered the same services we have grown accustomed to, or does Down-grading to Non-Official status mean exactly that - Down-grading of services?

St. Marys looks as if it is on the 'Hit -List' as far as our Government is concerned.

Hospital on list for review of existing services;
Lost our Rail Link;
Link Road junction altered - St. Marys now a by-pass;

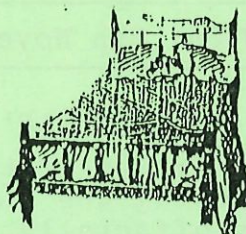

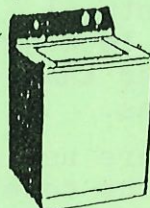

A BUSINESS PERSPECTIVE ON EDUCATION

Here are some extracts from an address by Dr. C. H. Bowman, Managing Director of B.P. Australia, to the 23rd National Conference of the Australian Secondary Principals' Association in Canberra last month.

Business' interest in education stems from a long term view of what will be needed to maintain our competitiveness and performance in the future. To continue to operate and add value for our share-

holders and customers alike, we need educated customers, and educated voters but perhaps most importantly, to compete successfully with the rest of the world, business needs an educated workforce.

The internationalisation of our economy - a road on which there is no U-turn - has meant that if Australian industry is to survive, it must be competitive. A country can be competitive in two basic ways.

Either you have cheap labour like a third world country - an option no-one can contemplate - or you utilise the talents of the populace as best you can. This is the only option for Australia. And for this policy of building on the talents of our people, we need quality education as the cornerstone.

This, then, explains why the major national business and industry organisation in Australia has made a declaration of goals for Australia's schools. The first and pre-eminent goal of this declaration is:

"Australia's schools to be at the forefront in achieving the highest standards when compared to the best in the world by the year 2000."

Most important is that students learn how to learn! If there ever were a time when students could expect to stop learning after they left school, it has surely passed. Education is becoming a lifelong process. No longer can education be regarded as a bank of knowledge which students can draw upon for the rest of their working career. More and more, workers will embark upon a career of lifelong learning, often changing career many times. Even those who remain in the same job will find that while the name of the position may remain the same, the actual demands of the job will alter in many ways.

In order that they have the capacity to cope with change, to learn new skills, to communicate, negotiate, and solve problems, students of the future will need to study a broad curriculum. Apart from the obvious: literacy, numeracy, and understanding of science and computer skills, they will need to understand the basic historical and geographical forces that have shaped our world. There is a tendency amongst some elements of the educational community to downplay the importance of this kind of knowledge, and to regard, say an understanding of world geography as "mere facts".

As this week is Fire Awareness Week it is appropriate to reflect on the recent bushfire events which we've already experienced this year in the Fingal Valley and the St. Helens area.

Two weeks ago on the Tuesday the Fingal and Portland Municipalities suffered from an abnormal weather pattern which caused extreme fire conditions (we had a temperature of 28C and NW winds to 100kmh).

The Forestry Commission was already fighting fires that had been deliberately lit. These fires soon went out of control and with the deliberate lighting of more on that day we soon had several severe out of control wild fires. All available firefighters were called in to assist with fire suppression, including all the local Tasmanian Fire Service (T.F.S.) brigades. This stretched resources so far that additional help was sent into the Valley from as far afield as Smithton and Ulverstone. Damage to forests, on both private property and State Forest, caused by these fires is severe with the possibility of some areas not recovering. St Patricks Head does look nice now driving towards St. Marys, brown burnt forest all around!

Since then the Fire Permit Period has been introduced in our two Municipalities, but people are still lighting fires without a permit. Perhaps this is due to there lack of proper advertising, and the continual advertising of the permit period (nothing at all on the "Box" news sessions), After this week we hope people will realise that permits are required to light fires.

Permits are available for the burning-off of material on your private property. These permits can be written out for you by your local Fire Permit Officer, or if they cannot be contacted, the local Council can issue you a permit. Permits for burning in or next to State Forest can be written out at the Forestry Offices. All of these permits are recorded by the T.F.S. in Launceston. One must remember there are certain obligations to be carried out by any and all Permit holders. This mainly involves burning under the right weather conditions and keeping the fire on your own property.

Last Friday the 1st. November the Forestry was called out to put out a fire on the Nicholas Road. We believe that this fire was possibly started by a person cutting firewood, using a chainsaw. This fire could have caused a lot of damage to either advanced Eucalypt regrowth forest, or radiata pine plantation if it had not been spotted early and acted upon immediately. Chainsaws have caused a number of fires in this district, so be careful when cutting firewood at any time.

(Permits are also required to cut firewood on State Forest.)

The fire season is just begining in our Municipalities so let us all hope that we can have a quiet season. This will allow all the personel who have to place themselves at risk to control these fires to spend more time home during the Summer with their families, enjoying the same advantages of the summer period on the East Coast as the remainder of the population.

TAXPAYERS REQUIRING RBL DETERMINATIONS DISADVANTAGED.

Thousands of recently retired or redundant workers in the last 12 months have encountered difficulties with the Insurance and Superannuation Commission in receiving their Reasonable Benefits Determinations.

A determination from the ISC is necessary before a taxpayer can lodge his tax return which needs to be lodged by 31 October. The Tax Commissioner via arrangements with the ISC has stated that there will be no late lodgement penalty if RBL determination is not received in time.

This does not compensate however the many taxpayers who are being denied a prompt return of their tax return cheques.

Those taxpayers receiving a determination also need to be aware that the Reasonable Benefit Limit of their termination payment, which is taxed concessionally, is calculated on their Highest Average Salary having been only \$25,000 for the past three years.

Any taxpayer who has had a higher salary will need to advise the ISC so that the Reasonable Benefit Limit can be checked. Otherwise, the tax paid will be too high.
