## F.D.F.A. HISTORY?

Letter to Mr Graeme McGee Secretary F.D.F.A. from Mr G. Shaw, M.L.C.

Dear Graeme,

This is a follow up letter about compiling a comprehensive history of the Fingal District Football Association as I suggested at the Annual Dinner on Friday 27th Sept.

Mrs Vicki Woods, Chairman of the Fingal Historical Society has indicated a positive interest. It is surely a bonus to have an active historical society operating at the heartland of the Association.

The Principal of the St. Marys District High School, Mr Graeme Beswick, indicated that students from that school could be involved with a research and compilation exercise as part of their 1992 curriculum.

Furthermore, I understand the Acting Senior Mistress in English and Social Science has already been involved with pupils in a somewhat similar exercise.

After the dinner function, Mr Bob Yates OAM, indicated he would be prepared to help. As an active life member of the F.D.F.A. and with all those years experience as Council Clerk of the Fingal Municipality, he would make an excellent co-ordinator for the project if adopted by the Association.

I suggest that 1992 be set aside as the year when this history is compiled. Maybe a fund raising exhibition could be held in the Tasmanian Hotel Civic Centre when enough information has been gathered. There are many possibilities.

To precipitate the project I gave a cheque for \$75.00 to Treasurer Arthur Dawson at the dinner.

While I recognise this to be but a token amount and the cost of the project may be considerable, I am equally confident that funding would not be a problem.

I trust the Association will adopt this proposal. It is always later than we think and procrastination is the thief of time.

If I can be of further assistance please advise.

RETAIL POST

The State Manager, Mr Bill Rae, said today that Australia Post's network has two main problems.

\* It operates at a loss, and this must be addressed if we are to keep our costs and the price of postage down

\* Outlets are frequently badly located to serve our customers in the 1990s

He said we have been working with unions to find solutions, and we will continue to do so.

It is our plan and desire to find more efficient ways of bringing retail post services to our customers.

Mr Rae said that the use of the word "closure" is of great concern to us, and is misleading. It would not be in our interests, as a service enterprise, nor is it our intention to close outlets and restrict use by our customers, but rather to find better ways of providing retail postal services.

It is premature to list post offices which would be affected. There is no "list" of post offices facing "closure". Obviously we have studied all of our outlets to know position, but there is no final "list".

Before any changes are made, there would be full consultation with local community leaders to ensure that there is complete understanding of the proposal and the service which would continue to be available.

### PRESENTATION DAY:

Our annual Presentation Day will be held on Friday, 13th December.

On that day, there will be a display of M.D.T. (Manual Arts), Home Economics and Art, Craft and Design work from 12 noon.

The secondary prize-giving will commence at 1.45 in the gymnasium. A display of student activities involving students from all grades will follow.

### MATHEMATICS

Mathematics is an important community issue.

Australia's social, environmental and economic well-being depends on more widespread scientific literacy and a workforce skilled in using and developing science and technology.

We must ensure that more students experience success and leave school enthused by and confident with mathematics.

All students should leave school with the attitudes and knowledge to enable them to continue to learn and apply the

mathematics they will need throughout their lives.

As the Australian economy becomes more dependent on science and technology, mathematics becomes increasingly important for all of us. We need to be able to link developments in mathematics, science and technology to many aspects of our lives. We need a broad understanding of mathematics, science and technology in our society so that all of us can participate in decision-making about our social and physical environment. The implication for mathematics is that we need an education that will excite and inspire confidence in many more students to continue with mathematics learning throughout their post-compulsory schooling and into their future lives.

We must take care that all students have the opportunity to experience success with appropriate mathematics, regardless of their geographic location, gender, age, social class or ethnic origins. We must also aim for access to and success in mathematics for students who have specific learning difficulties, as well as foster talent in mathematics.

In the past, the tendency was for those students who were least successful in mathematics to stop studying it as early as possible. Many did not remain in formal education beyond the compulsory years. The mathematics courses available to those who did remain at school were often designed to be preparatory to higher education rather than immediately or personally useful. Consequently, many students saw little value in continuing in further mathematics education. Many people used very little mathematics beyond what they learned during their primary schooling. Alternatively, they learned quite job-specific mathematics. Full employment was generally available and sufficient people were moving into mathematically related fields.

That situation no longer exists. The mathematical demands of daily, civic and working life are increasing and changing. Job reclassifications are breaking down barriers which previously

confined people to narrowly defined categories of work. If people are to cope with these changes, then they will need to be prepared to become learners of mathematics for the rest of their lives. Their experiences with school mathematics must encourage them to do so.

### RATIONALISATION OF SCHOOL BUS SERVICES:

The Transport Division of the Department of Roads and Transport has prepared a proposal to rationalise bus services to the school.

Briefly, the proposal involves altering services so that a large bus from Bicheno meets a smaller bus at a Chain of Lagoons interchange and then proceeds through Four Mile Creek to collect students from Falmouth before coming to school via the St Marys Pass.

The smaller bus will travel from Chain of Lagoons to St Marys via the Elephant Pass, drop off the students at school and then travel to Cornwall to bring the Cornwall students to school.

A bus seating 45 adults will travel from Mathinna and interchange at Fingal with the smaller bus which will continue to travel from Rossarden.

These alterations raise problems of additional travelling times, early departure times in the morning and late arrival home times at night, supervisor problems created by early arrival and late departure times from school, the overcrowding of buses and the general welfare of students.

It is stressed that this is only a proposal and that there could be alternatives that may be acceptable to the Transport Division.

There is a period of 21 days from 7th November during which comments can be made.

Next Year, Miss Francesca will be conducting Jazz and Classical Ballet classes before school. Interested people should contact Miss Francesca on 761127. Some of the things you need to know about the school are listed below;

Types of Dancing Taught....Classical Ballet, Jazz Ballet.

Syllabus taught....Australian Teachers of Dancing (A.T.O.D.)

Age to start training....Normally around 5 years of age for Classical and around 5 years of age for Jazz.

Transport....Students studying at St Marys and Fingal during School hours must be aware that it is the parents responsibility to get the child to and from class.

Fees....May be paid by the week or term. Class fees are required regardless of attendance. A joining fee of \$10.00 is payable BEFORE commencing classes. This fee covers the whole family for the full time they choose to dance and is NOT an annual fee.

Stage work....This School teaches all facets of stage work and each year we endeavour to stage a concert for students studying in St Helens and Bicheno. Students studying in St Marys and Fingal will have a special breakup where they will dress up and perform for family and friends.

Regulation dress....Must be worn for all classes. Neatness is stressed. Uniform must be clean and well looked after. One month is allowed in which to obtain uniform. (It is most important that the students take pride in their appearance as dancing is a visual art.

Uniform requirements are....ALL LEOTARDS TO BE NYLON

Juniors (Classical): Pink sleeveless leotard, pink tights and pink ballet shoes, pink headbands and pink georgette skirts. Pink crossovers and leg warmers for winter are optional.

Seniors (Classical): Black sleeveless leotard, pink tights and black georgette skirts. Pink ballet shoes with pink ribbon Black crossovers and leg warmers for winter are optional.

Junior and Senior (Jazz): Black sleeveless leotard, pink tights and black ballet shoes with black elastic.

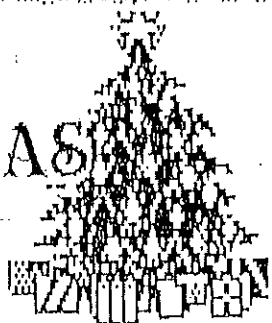

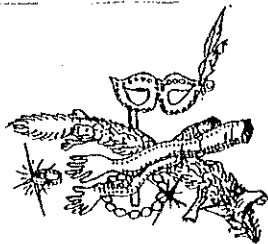

**NEW COASTAL ROUTE TO BE OFFICIALLY  
OPENED ON 2ND DECEMBER.**

This new 23 kilometre road just completed, begins near Falmouth and ends with a junction with the Tasman Highway at Chain of Lagoons. It will become the Tasman Highway eliminating the tortuous bends encountered on St.Marys and Elephant Pass. The existing Tasman Highway from St.Marys to Falmouth Road will become an extension of the Esk Main Road, and from St.Marys to Chain of Lagoons, the Elephant Pass Main Road. As the road runs close to the rugged foreshore it will allow tourists scenic views of the East Coast and the Tasman Sea. The travel time saved is estimated to be between 15 and 20 minutes. It is proposed to reconstruct the existing Falmouth Road from the junction with the Tasman Highway to the new section. The new road has been designed to modern highway standards with a sealed width of 8 metres including shoulders. Guard rails have been installed in areas of high embankment. Accesses to the new road will be controlled to prevent undesirable frontage development that would result in safety problems.

PLAN FOR YOUR EMPLOYER OBLIGATIONS

Increasingly businesses are being placed under more and more pressure as a result of their statutory reporting requirements, which if not planned for in advance can have serious consequences for the unwary. The following is a brief summary of some of the issues to plan for and avoid.

PAYE DECLARATIONS

From 1 December 1991 a programme of audits of employment declaration forms will commence. The program will aim to ensure proper compliance by employers and their employees with the PAYE obligations as well as providing information on the misuse of Tax File numbers.

The declaration will also be used by the Department of Social Security to ascertain the unidentified earnings of employees for the purposes of the Child Support Agency.

It is therefore the employers responsibility to ensure that employment declaration forms are complete and do not contain misleading information. Penalties will likely be imposed on those employers failing to ensure the correctness of these forms.

1990/1991 COMPANY TAX FORM

Broadly speaking the lodgement date for a tax paying company with 30th June 1991 year end is 15th March 1992. The exception to this is those companies with estimated or notional tax liabilities of \$1,000 or more but less than \$20,000 that have elected to pay 100% of their tax liability on the 15th December 1991, at which time the tax returns must be lodged.

Taxpayers are reminded that careful planning and record-keeping is required to provide adequate support for the limited information contained in the simplified Form C.

Taxpayers should be gearing up for the preparation of the return and should avoid leaving the matter until the last minute.

YOUR RIGHTS AND THE CONDUCT OF TAX AUDITORS

With Tax Office audits becoming more commonplace many taxpayers are under the misconception that the Tax Office can do just about anything in the course of the audit. Not only do you have specific rights and obligations, but the auditor is regulated by internal Tax Office guidelines in how they conduct the audit.

YOUR RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS

- \* The Commissioner and his representatives is entitled to full and free access to your premises, books and documents
- \* carefully check auditors authorisation, if it is incomplete you should deny access to the auditor
- \* you are required to provide reasonable facilities and assistance including use of office equipment
- \* the auditor does not under Section 263 have the authority to remove documents, however copies can be made
- \* nominate a certain staff member to be the contact point for the auditor

TAX AUDITOR CONDUCT

- \* be judicious in use of their power
- \* be mindful of claims for legal professional privilege
- \* allow the audit to be delayed temporarily where the taxpayer requests an opportunity to seek legal advice
- \* continue attempts to gain lawful access even in cases where the taxpayer has advised that the records are not relevant for the purpose of the audit

**CONSUMERS PAY HIDDEN TAX ON PHONE BILLS**

Anyone who subscribes to Telecom or who uses a public telephone IS paying wholesale sales tax indirectly as a component of their charges.

According to figures given to the Coalition by Telecom, \$375 million in wholesales sales tax was paid on capital equipment purchases in 1990/91.

The wholesales sales tax is passed on to ordinary telephone users in the form of higher telephone charges which average out to an additional cost of almost \$50 a year for each of Telecom's eight million plus subscribers.

Under the Coalition's tax reform proposals, including a goods and services tax, all the GST paid by Telecom on capital equipment purchases will be rebatable. Consequently, Telecom will effectively get a \$375 million boost to its capital equipment programme.

This will have an enormous impact on Telecom's capacity to compete internationally, particularly as exports will be zero-rated under GST, and on the overall productivity of Telecom in the domestic marketplace.

**COUNCIL'S CASH ALLOWANCES - FBT MAY APPLY**

Certain camp cash allowances paid to road maintenance workers could soon be subject to fringe benefits tax.

This claim was made last week by Senator John Watson (Lib., Tas.) during a committee review of taxation legislation.

"Advice from a Queensland Shire Council that they are liable to pay fringe benefits tax on camp allowances paid to employees has sent a chill wind across the business community", Senator Watson said.

The revelation came following Government assurances that cash payments in the nature of living away from home allowances to oil and gas rig workers are now being taxed under the fringe benefit tax regime would be quarantined and not flow across to other awards.

The amendment before Parliament follows a court decision, Attwood Oceanics v.s Federal Commissioner of Taxation, which rejected the application of Fringe Benefits Tax to award cash payments in the nature of living away from home allowances.
