COAL: A JOBS-FRIENDLY ENERGY OPTION

More than any other State, the Tasmanian economy depends on the continuing supply of low cost electricity to industry. Conservation objectives, political factors and financial realities now rule out new low cost hydro-electric schemes. However, it is imperative that Tasmania maintains and if possible enhances its competitive advantage of low-cost electricity supply. The State's ability to attract new investment in existing industries as well as new industries will in large measure depend on the availability of cost-competitive electricity.

Further, Tasmania should aim to maximise the value derived from its electricity resource. One of the questions to be asked in considering new energy options is whether Tasmania should be a peak-load generator for other States, or whether it should concentrate on adding further value to its electricity resource through locally based downstream processing industries.

FUTURE SUPPLY OPTIONS

As discussed above, Tasmania will require substantial new electricity supply sources during the next decade, even if targets are met for gains in energy efficiency. The various major options have been well canvassed, as has the potential for cogeneration and alternative electricity sources. The major options are natural gas, submarine interconnection with Victoria, and of course coal. It is notable that several industrial sites already cogenerating, or with cogeneration potential, utilise coal as a primary energy source.

THE COAL OPTION

Several options are being canvassed for coal by the HEC:

- a small (up to 50 MW) fluidised bed combustion station burning waste from the Fingal coal washery operated by the Cornwall Coal Company
- an up to 180 MW fluidised bed station burning washery waste and/or run of mine coal
- one conventional (pulverised coal) station comprising two 200 MW units.

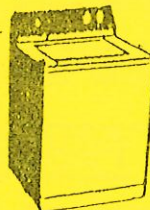

JOHN WATSON SENATOR FOR TASMANIA
HARDSHIP APPEALS BOARD SHOULD STAY

"The Hardship Appeals Board which has the discretion to release taxpayers' from tax liability in cases of hardship should not be abolished," Senator John Watson (Lib., Tas.) announced today.

"The government announced the repeal of section 265 and thus the abolition of the independent hardship board in its 1990 budget."

"The utilisation of this process of appeal by taxpayers over the last 12 months is evidence that the Hardship Appeal Board is a necessity." "618 people were granted either full or partial relief from tax liability by the hardship Board during the year ended 30 June 1991."

"The maximum amount of relief granted in any one case was \$907,260, with the average value of assistance given for each person being \$17,323."

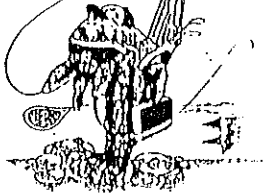
"Whilst the appropriate section has yet to be repealed, the Government has advised that a decision on the most appropriate arrangements for the handling of hardship cases will be made in the near future."

AUSTRALIAN SHAREMARKET GAME 1991

The Sharemarket Game is an educational exercise conducted by the Australian Stock Exchange. The game is designed to assist high school students to learn about the operations of the stockmarket and to provide a practical, "no risk" opportunity for them to experience investment in shares.

In 1991 there were 880 syndicates entered from schools throughout the state which means 2676 students were involved.

Each syndicate is allocated \$50,000 to invest in shares. Throughout the year, each syndicate has monitored their shares, selling some, buying new ones, taking dividends and getting fully involved in all the transactions that take place in trading shares. The idea of the Sharemarket Game is to try and increase the value of their \$50,000 portfolio over the 8 month period.

A WORLD CLASS SERVICE

The Tasmanian Lions Eye Diagnostic Centre is a world class clinic which identifies and treats eye problems beyond the scope of public hospitals or private medical practices.

It was established in 1981 and is funded by Tasmanian Lions Clubs and the Tasmanian Lions Foundation Incorporated. It does not receive any government assistance.

WHO ARE THE PATIENTS?

Loss of vision can have many causes, including tumours and diseases affecting the nervous system or the eye itself. But it is the elderly and those afflicted with diabetes who will almost inevitably suffer partial or total loss of vision.

The number of diabetes sufferers in Tasmania increases every year, and, as our population ages and life expectancy increases, so does the number of elderly in our community. Naturally and tragically, so also does the number of potential patients.

COVERING THE STATE

The Centre has a committed, multi-disciplinary staff and is attached to St. John's Hospital in Hobart. Its highly specialised hi-tech equipment, from fluoroscopes to an argon laser, was bought with money raised by Lions Clubs.

Because it is the only facility of its kind in Tasmania, an outreach programme takes its services to centres state-wide, using a specially-equipped bus as a mobile clinic. In this way people as far from Hobart as Smithton or St. Helens share fully in the benefits the Centre can offer.

TREATING THE WHOLE PERSON

Vision loss, particularly when it occurs suddenly, can destroy confidence, reduce independence and create emotional problems, both for the individual and his or her family.

It also creates new physical and social needs, particularly for elderly people who can no longer use a telephone, catch a bus, read directions on their medication or safely use everyday home appliances.

For these reasons the Centre provides a welfare service, and an occupational therapy service in the home. Through them, patients and their families are helped to make the home safe and thus allow the patients to make best use of their residual vision, assisted by such basic aids as improved lighting and oversize phone dialling templates.

As a result, many elderly Tasmanians maintain their cherished independence and stay out of nursing homes. Unfortunately, lack of money presently restricts the welfare service to southern Tasmania.

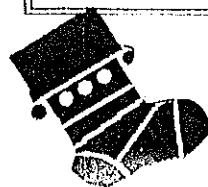
