## PREVENT FOOD POISONING

Our summer this year, if one can call it that, has been very trying. Warm sticky weather with not much sun.

These are just the conditions likely to predispose to food poisoning and since the commonest of these are zoonoses, derived directly and indirectly from animals, a few words of warning are timely.

In order to emphasise my points, I'll put them in the form of a quiz.

1. Firstly, thawing frozen meats is best done in a sink or on a draining board; true or false? Definitely false; thawing any frozen food on benches or such like can encourage contamination and bacterial growth. All frozen foods should either be thawed in a refrigerator or defrosted in a microwave oven, employing the correct cycle for the purpose.

2. Next, eating under-cooked mince is safer than eating rare steak; true or false?

Also false; while there is a possibility of ingesting contamination from raw steak, raw mince is riskier because it's handled more frequently.

3. Fresh meat and poultry should be frozen in the wrappers in which they are purchased; true or false? This is true because by rewrapping them there is a risk of causing bacterial contamination.

4. Food being cooked in a microwave oven doesn't need to be turned during the process; true or false? False; due to the different method of applying energy it's possible

for cold spots to occur in microwaves, so it is important to turn or stir all food cooked in this way to ensure even heat distribution. Of course this is made clear in the instructions accompanying these cookers when they are bought, but how many people read them?

5. Poultry should be stuffed at least one hour before it's planned to cook it; true or false? Again this is definitely false. While rigid health standards apply to premises supplying table poultry and while companies concerned monitor the process fastidiously, it's almost impossible to ensure that the inside of such a carcass is bacterially sterile.

Premature stuffing can encourage any residual organisms to grow in the period leading up to cooking, actually multiplying in the seasoning itself. As well, the stuffing can act as an insulator, preventing heat reaching the inside to kill any bacteria there.

Ideally, stuffing should be introduced after the chicken has spent some time in the oven, or at worst, at the last minute before cooking commences.

Finally, I urge every culinary activist to buy themselves a probe thermometer with which they can check that all oven-cooked meat has attained the correct internal temperature; 70 degrees for pork and beef; 75 degrees for veal and lamb and 80 degrees for all poultry.

PENSIONER DEEMING RATE LOWERED TO 6%

"The reduced deeming rate for interest earned by pensioners is an acknowledgment of the lower rates available for investments," Senator John Watson (Lib, Tas) said today commenting on the Government move to lower the deeming rate from 8% to 6%.

"Part-time pensioners will benefit with an increase in their pensions, while full rate pensions will not be affected at all."

"Under the deeming system, pensioners are assumed to have earned the deemed interest rate on their savings, whether they have earned it or not."

"The constant changing of the rate is confusing for pensioners who expect their retirement years to be free of worry. The rate in response to changes to market interest rates has dropped from 10% to 8% to now 6% in the last 12 months."

"The new rate will commence on February 20 for Veteran Affairs pensioners and February 27 for Social Security pensions.

Pensioners who have previously notified the Department of Social Security that they have savings in the special pensioner accounts with banks and other financial institutions will not need to notify the DSS.

"The DSS and Veteran Affairs will need to know if there have been changes to other investments such as term deposits." Senator Watson concluded.

END OF COPPER COINS

Supplies of 1 cent and 2 cent copper coins will cease to be available from banks from 1 February, 1992.

From that date, the reserve Bank of Australian will no longer issue available stocks of the coins to the banking system and financial institutions will be asked to return stocks of the coins they may be holding to the Reserve Bank.

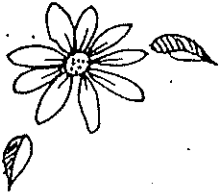
Even after the one and two cent coins disappear, the cent will remain the basic unit of account and goods and services can still be priced in multiples of one cent.

Therefore, transactions by cheques, credit cards and electronic funds transfer at point of sale would continue to be made to the exact cent. Only cash transactions would need to be rounded.

It is expected that competition and a desire to adopt customer-friendly practices will result in businesses rounding down to the nearest five or ten cents. The Prices Surveillance Authority have issued the following guidelines to cover situations where competitive rounding does not occur.

- 1 & 2 cents rounded DOWN to nearest 10
- 3 & 4 cents rounded UP to nearest 5
- 6 & 7 cents rounded DOWN to nearest 5
- 8 & 9 cents rounded UP to nearest 10

## WALDORF SALAD

450g (1lb) Eating Apples

Juice of 1 Lemon

5ml (1 tsp) Sugar

150ml ( $\frac{1}{4}$  pint) Mayonnaise

$\frac{1}{2}$  Head Celery, washed, trimmed and sliced.

50g (2oz) Walnuts, chopped

1 Lettuce

Few Walnut halves, to garnish (optional)

1. Core the apples, slice one and dice the rest. Dip the slices in lemon juice to prevent discoloration of the fruit.

2. Toss the diced apples in 30ml lemon juice, the sugar and 15ml mayonnaise and leave to stand for about 30 minutes.

3. Just before serving, add the sliced celery, chopped walnuts and the remaining mayonnaise, and toss together.

# RECREATIONAL SEA FISHING IN TASMANIA NETTING

## DEFINITIONS OF NETS

A recreational fisher may only use the following nets in State Fishing Waters (where restrictions do not apply). The mesh size of a net may be calculated by measuring the mesh when it is stretched diagonally.

(a) one mullet net, having a mesh of not less than 60mm nor more than 70mm and having a length not greater than 50 metres;

(b) two graball nets having a mesh of not less than 100 mm nor more than 140 mm and having a length not greater than 50 metres;

(Please note: A gillnet means a single bunt of netting weighted on the leadline (groundline) and buoyed along the corkline (headline), which is intended when set to be on the sea floor and includes mullet and graball nets).

(c) one beach seine net, the mesh of the bag or bunt of which is not less than 30 mm and having a length not greater than 50 metres;

(Please note: A person who uses a beach seine net in State Fishing Waters shall:

(i) bunt up and empty the net in the water; and

(ii) not draw the net ashore while fish remain in it. The intention of this regulation is to ensure that the catch is sorted in the water so that unwanted and undersize fish can be released in good condition. No fish should be stranded out of the water during sorting).

## BUOY SPECIFICATIONS

All graball and mullet nets must be marked with an orange, pink or red surface buoy at one end of the net and a white surface buoy at the other. Each buoy must have a minimum diameter of 200mm (8")

## WEIGHT SPECIFICATIONS

All nets must be weighted at both ends of the leadline (groundline) with a weight of at least two kilograms. As the weight may snag on the seabed it is a good idea to attach the weight with a relatively low breaking strain twine so that they can break free if required. This requirement is currently under review and may be amended. Please contact the Division of Sea Fisheries if in doubt.



## MINIMUM LEGAL SIZES

### FINFISH (whole fish):

- 200 mm - Mullet;
- 230 mm - Bream, Garfish, Perch (Morwong);
- 250 mm - Flounder (Sole);
- 300 mm - Flathead;
- 330 mm - Real and Bastard Trumpeter;
- 710 mm - School shark (Snapper shark);
- 750 mm - Gummy shark.

All these measurements are from the tip of the snout to the tip of the tail.

In the case of gutted shark, the legal size is measured from the middle of the posterior edge of the gill slit nearest the tail to the ventral insertion of the caudal fin. This distance must not be less than 400mm for Schoolshark (Snapper shark) or 450 mm for Gummy shark.

Any undersized fish must be returned to the water immediately after capture with the minimum of damage.

NB - Bream. It is prohibited to spear bream in all State Fishing Waters.

FINGAL VALLEY 1864  
EXTRACT FROM WALCH'S ALMANAC

The District of Fingal lies to the east of the main line of road from Hobart to Launceston, which you leave at Willis' Corners, nine miles south of Campbell Town, and commences at the Salisbury Rivulet, commonly known as the Stoney Creek, six miles from "The Corners", the boundary between the districts of Campbell Town and Fingal.

Leaving the Salisbury Rivulet and proceeding eastward towards the coast, you pass first through the estate of Selma, the residence in 1864 of J.M.M. McKinnon. The house stands to the left of the road, not far from the South Esk River, and commands a fine view of the noble mountain Ben Lomond, a most picturesque feature of the landscape at this point.

Adjoining Selma, the attractive estate of Eastbourne, the property then (1864) of Humphrey Grey, whose residence stands to the left of the road.

After passing Eastbourne, the estate of Benham is crossed, the property of Arthur O'Connor (1864) of Connorville, Lake River. To the right of the road, but not in view stands Benham House, the residence of Charles Allan Parker.

At this point, the road leading to the valley of the St. Paul's River, leaves the high road and conducts you past Roy's Hill, the residence of Captain Hepburn (1864), an octogenarian, who, on his arrival in the colony upwards of 35 years since (1829), became the original grantee from the Crown.

Rev's Lea, the residence of James Hepburn; Rock House the residence of Edwin Boultee; Brookstead the residence of Robert Cowie; all old and respected colonists, also the original grantees from the Crown of their several estates.

Beyond these is the Crown Reserve for the township of Leipsic; and higher up the St. Paul's River, are the estates of Lewis Hill, in the occupation (1864) of Mr. A.F. Hogg; the Red Rock in the occupation of Mr. John Storey; "No Where Else" in the occupation of Messrs Smith.

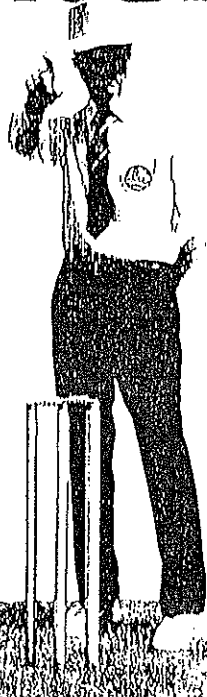
