SIGNS OF THE TIMES

"When your number comes up....." Fast, effective response is vital, if lives are to be saved. This system in the article below has not been adopted in Tasmania yet, but it is worthwhile looking in to.

Australia has a beautiful and expansive coastline continually being accessed by the general public and professionals, all year round. In the event of an accident on the beach, in the sea or along the coastal waterways, our rescue services are confronted with the major problem of identifying the exact location in which the accident occurred.

Delay can mean death, therefore concise and accurate directions are vital. Even permanent residents in an area, can have difficulty in describing precisely where help or assistance is required. As over 80% of beach users are not local residents, but are visitors to an area, their geographic knowledge of an area is minimal. They can rarely pin point quickly, the location of an accident for the emergency services.

In 1984, Mr Craig Simpson, a local Torquay surf lifesaver, recognised the need for easy identification of areas along our foreshores and waterways.

Suffice to say, the solution is simple, and has already been shown to be effective. NUMBERED EMERGENCY BEACH SIGNS AND WATERWAY SIGNS... ERECTED ALONG THE VICTORIAN COAST - LINE.

Each Pyramid sign on the beach is plainly visible from land, sea or air and has a corresponding rectangular sign at the entrance to an access track from a roadway or carpark. The signs are specifically located to ensure that the public must walk past the sign en route to the beach.

An awareness of the area number and emergency phone number is immediately created. Witnesses to an accident have no difficulty in giving precise directions to any emergency service - they simply quote the Beach Sign or the corresponding numbered Road Sign.

These numbers can be quickly cross referenced on the map issued to each rescue organization and this map will also be listed for public use in Melways directory.

Evaluations of the Beach and Waterways Emergency identification system in Victoria, provided by the various emergency services in the area, have shown that there is a definite need to extend the project to all coastal areas. It has been recommended by the members of the working party, that a master plan for the whole of the Victorian coastline be developed, with the possibility of the plan being extended Nationally.

The department of Conservation, Forests and Lands has indicated that it is willing to co-ordinate the project on a state wide basis.

It would be the responsibility of the Public Lands manager for each region having coastline and waterways, to allocate numbers for beach and waterway access tracks. It will also be the Department's responsibility to ensure that all of the signs constructed are to the specifications, which are available from the Ocean Grove/ Barwon Heads Lions Club.

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CONTINUING OUR EXTRACTS FROM
WALCH'S FINGAL VALLEY ALMANAC
1864.

Beyond the estate of Lewis Hill the road continues towards the East Coast, branching off to the left towards Bicheno, and to the right towards Swanport, but in crossing the intervening tiers, is a very rough, rocky and occasionally precipitous bush track.

The estate of Benham adjoins the township of Avoca, situated on both banks of the St. Paul's River, which is here crossed by a platform bridge, supported on stone piers with stone abutments, some twenty feet or more in height above its bed. The stream has been known often to rise nearly 20 feet in a very few hours during the winter season, after a fall of heavy rain from the south-east.

Descending to the bridge you have on the left the Parsonage, and looking down the course of the river you may observe the delightfully situated and picturesque villa residence of Bona Vista, the property of Simeon Lord, Now in the occupation of John Swam (Member of the House of Assembly for the District of Fingal); and standing at the Junction of the St. Paul's with the South Esk Rivers, is seen the pretty cottage of Grayfort, the residence of Francis Lord (1864)


From this point also the view of the majestic Ben Lomond is very fine indeed, rising in grandeur high above the intervening ranges.

In front of the traveller stands the church (St. Thomas), a stone structure, on a fine site, but it is to be regretted that it exhibits the effect of neglect and want of repair, especially the interior, on its damp, discoloured walls.

To the right you command a view of the St. Paul's Dome, a mount about 1200 feet in height, not very distant, the abrupt termination of the range which divides the valleys of the South Esk and St. Paul's Rivers.

LOONGANNA by Esme Atkinson

Loonganna was not a town, it was just an undiscovered wilderness, along way from modern civilization. Four families with young children lived here. People of Loonganna were alternatives and believed in getting back to the land, and leading a simple life. Many people went without power as it was not necessary. Shops weren't within a 2 hour drive. Vegetable gardens and fruit trees were a part of everybody's back yards, as you couldn't do without them. Forgotten shacks and houses were eaten away by the forever growing bush and the unpredictable weather. Trees and shrubs crept in over what was meant to be the main road, the one and only road, but was more like a wallaby track. Potholes grew larger every rainfall, eventually causing large ditches. Rain would fall as often as once a week, filling up wombat burrows and dried up muddy ponds. Platypuses would swim silently from their burrows into the cold mountain streams. The snow caused the trees and bushes to sag under the weight, as small children tried to drag themselves through the kneeheight snow. Snowmen were built in abundance by children in woollen gloves, hats and coats, with little glowing red faces, while the adults has snowball fights. The icicles hung like daggers from roofs of every house and shack. The bush surrounding the houses or shacks, as most of them were, was like an untouched jungle. Dingy outside toilets were breeding homes

for many species of spiders. Shiny black snakes curled up on porches, baking in the sweltering heat of the hot summer days. Flowers wilted from the intense heat, as the bush hummed from the sounds of cicada's, crickets and bees. Flowering wattle trees could be seen in the hundreds glowing a fluorescent yellow. Sweet smelling, snow white sassafras flowers fell from the trees, to the forest floors making a soft white carpet.

Loonganna was something special and I think I am very lucky to grow up in such a beautiful area. It was something most people will never get to experience with the ever so fast depletion of our rain forests. It is something I will never forget.

MY TOWN by Renee Morris

Our town, nestled between mountains on either side, is hardly a place one could call lively or even interesting, but of course to me and some five hundred other people who live here, St Marys is home and the ties to it are very strong, so much so, that when I'm away for too long, I feel myself yearning again for the peaceful comforts and safety it seems to offer me.

With its many old and some delapidated aging houses and buildings, it must seem to the busy people passing through as just another forgotten town on the way to their destination, that lacks the clean fresh vibrance, beauty and attraction that some towns and cities can offer. 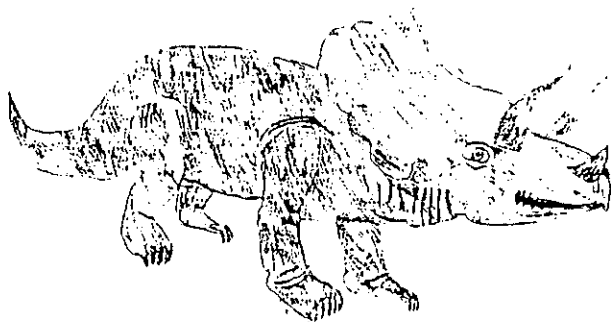

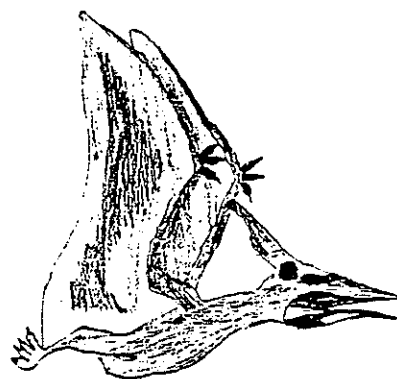

TOFU, ONIONS AND WATERCRESS

- 1 Large Onion sliced into rounds
- 2 Cakes Tofu
- $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ Tsp Grated Ginger
- 1 Bunch Watercress
- 1 - 2 Tsp Tamari (traditional soya sauce without sugar)

Slice onions into thick rounds and place on bottom of a saucepan. Cover with water. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until onions are almost done (about 10 min). Slice tofu into 2 inch cubes and place on top of the onions. Sprinkle grated ginger over tofu. Cover and cook for 5 min. Add tamari and place watercress on top of tofu, cover and cook for 1 more minute. Serve in saucepan you cooked it in, no stirring or mixing necessary during preparation or for serving.

As a variation, use broccoli, cauliflower, carrots, cabbage or other vegetable in season instead of watercress.

SULTANA CHEWS

- 3 cups rice bubbles
- 1 cup peanut butter ($\frac{1}{2}$ jar)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup honey
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup brown sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla essence
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sultanas

Combine peanut butter, honey & brown sugar in large saucepan. Cook, stirring over low heat until melted & thoroughly combined. Remove from heat, stir in essence, sultanas & rice bubbles until completely coated. Press into tin & chill.

RADIO COMMUNICATIONS

Radio transceivers must be licensed by the Department of Transport & Communication. Radio operators must hold a Restricted Radio Operators Certificate of Proficiency. For your own security and that of others, do not wilfully misuse the distress and urgency signals. After having sent a distress message and the emergency ceases, you must broadcast a cancellation message. Refer to the enquiries page for Hobart and Tasma Radio telephone numbers as well as the DTC. Hobart Radio may be contacted for detailed brochures on radio communication.

When your life or vessel is in grave danger switch to the appropriate distress frequency, ie. 2182, 4125, 6215 kHz or VHF channel 16.

The procedure in case of a distress call is:

SAY: MAYDAY MAYDAY MAYDAY

THIS IS.....(your ships name 3 times)

MAYDAY. Then give your position, describe the nature of distress, specify help required, supply other information to assist your rescue, then listen on the same frequency for a reply.

The procedure in case of an emergency call is:

SAY: PANPAN PANPAN PANPAN

THIS IS.....(your ships name 3 times)

Then give your urgent message and listen on the same frequency for a reply. If you have a message which concerns safety of navigation or an important meteorological warning, follow the procedures in a PAN situation but replace PANPAN with saying SAY-CURE-E-TAY (3 times).

RESOURCE SECURITY LEGISLATION

ARTICLE BY MAX BURR, M.P.

The government has introduced a Resource Security Bill into Federal Parliament.

However, the Bill, in its present form, will not be supported by the Opposition.

The proper test of such legislation is whether it would prevent political intervention during the life of a project. Clearly the Government's Bill will not because the Federal Government could intervene at any time for a variety of reasons.

The Liberal Party believes the prime responsibility for all land use decisions should lie with State Governments.

Federal legislation should only be used to compliment decisions made by the States.

The Opposition has proposed an amendment which incorporates three features:-

1. Legislative backing to State or Regional forest strategies drawn-up according to Commonwealth approved procedures.

2. Project specific legislation for agreements between a State and proponents of large scale projects such as pulp mill, provided environmental and other requirements, such as foreign investment rules, are met.

3. The minimisation of Commonwealth and State administration.

The Liberal Party totally supports the need for resource security legislation, and since December has attempted to negotiate with the Government to bring about genuine resource security. However, the Government has shown no preparedness to budge from the loose and poorly drafted bill presented to Parliament.

In its present form, the Bill provides no greater security for timber users than in the past.

The Liberal Party will not support such shoddy legislation, but stands ready to work with

the Government, the States and the industry to produce appropriate legislation that provides genuine resource security.

The most important factor should be to remove political expediency from resource development projects, but sadly the present Bill does not live up to the firm proposal expected by the public.
