PENSIONERS DEEMING CUT TO 8 PERCENT

"The cut from 10% to 8% in the Government deemed interest on pensioner saving accounts is much more realistic given the continuing decline in interest rates," Senator John Watson (Lib, Tas) said today.

"The rate will be reviewed twice yearly in future and had placed too great a responsibility on pensioners to shift savings," Senator Watson continued.

"The lower rate will take effect from June 6th for aged pension and June 13th for veterans. 25,000 people will no longer be affected by the new deemed rate and all other part-rate pensioners will have an increase.

As a consequence, a single pensioner can now have \$26,000 and a married couple \$45,000 earning 8 percent before their pensions are affected.

Pensioners will not need to make any changes with their banks as the majority of banks have special pensioner accounts which are tied to the deemed rate.

The system was originally introduced to end the widespread practice of pensioners keeping money in low or non-interest bearing accounts to avoid the income test. As a result the disposal income of pensioners has increased.

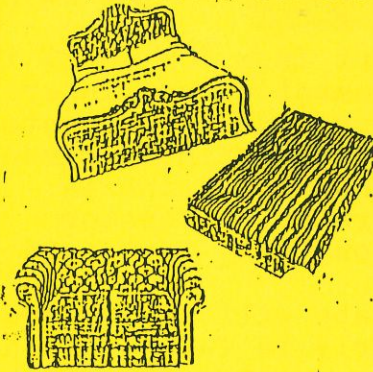

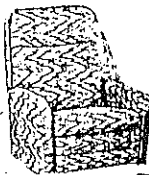

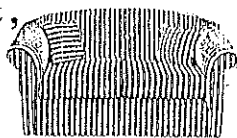

MICROWAVE RECIPES

POTATO CASSEROLE

- 6 - 8 Medium size potatoes - peeled
and finely sliced
- $\frac{1}{4}$ Cup cream or sour cream
- 1 - 2 Medium size Onions - finely
sliced
- $\frac{1}{2}$ Cup tasty cheese - grated
- 2 Rashers bacon- finely chopped

METHOD

1. Layer potatoes, cream and onions
alternately in a 2 litre casserole
dish.
2. Sprinkle cheese and bacon over
the top.
3. Cook covered on HIGH for 30 mins.
4. Allow to stand, covered for
further 10 mins.
(Please Note - Some potatoes cook
quicker than others.)

EASY SWEET AND SOUR SAUCE

- $\frac{1}{4}$ Cup Cornflour
- $\frac{1}{4}$ Cup Brown Sugar
- 2 Cups crushed pineapple and juice
(450g can)
- $\frac{1}{2}$ Cup Water
- $\frac{1}{3}$ Cup Vinegar
- 1 Tablespoon Soy Sauce
- 1 - 2 Tablespoons Tomato Paste or
Puree

METHOD

1. Combine cornflour and sugar in
large glass jug.
2. Gradually stir in remaining
ingredients.
3. Cook on HIGH for 4 - 5 minutes,
stirring frequently.

MUNICIPAL NEWS

MOWING OF NATURE STRIPS

The large amount of time spent by Council's works staff mowing and maintaining nature strips within the various townships was discussed at the April Council Meeting. It was decided that Council would adopt a policy of mowing nature strips adjacent to main highways only, but that such mowing would be extended to non-highway areas during the main growth periods if fire hazard conditions arise.

HOUSEHOLD RUBBISH COLLECTION

Council's Health Surveyor, Mr. Masters, recommended that Council consider the provision of household garbage collection services in the major towns of the Municipality. Mr. Masters advised that preliminary investigations suggested that a weekly household collection service could be established for about \$20 per household per year. It was decided that Mr. Masters would pursue this matter further and report back to Council.

FOOTPATH - GRAY ROAD, ST. MARYS

The St. Marys District High School Parents and Friends Association wrote requesting that Council extend the footpath along Gray Road from the entrance to the High School to the bridge, including the erection of a safety barrier. It was agreed that the school appeared to have legitimate grounds for concern and it was resolved that the Works Manager would investigate the matter with the Department of Roads and Transport.

MCINTYRES BEACH

At its April meeting Council discussed the matter of access to McIntyres Beach relative to the Development Plan to be prepared for the Four Mile Creek area. It was decided that Council would write to the Minister for Parks Wildlife and Heritage requesting that the Department purchase the privately owned land on the foreshore of McIntyres Beach plus the land between McIntyres Beach and the link road.

LIONS STUDENT SPEAKING COMPETITION

On Thursday, 16th May, students representing the four Lions Clubs of this zone - St. Helens, St. Marys, Bicheno and Swansea-Glamorgan - competed in the final of the Lions Student Speaking Competition at St. Marys.

Each finalist delivered a five minute prepared speech and a two minute impromptu speech.

The adjudicator, Mr. Patrick Riley, praised the students for their performances and book vouchers from Birchalls were presented to the students on behalf of the Lions Clubs of the zone.

Belinda Pyke, representing the St. Helens club won first prize with a prepared talk on racism and an impromptu talk on making a phone call.

Two students from this school, Tamatha Grose, representing the St. Marys club and Kylie Freeman representing Bicheno were placed second and third respectively

Alison Webb from Triabunna District High School, represented the Swansea-Glamorgan club.

WORK EXPERIENCE PROGRAMME

Each year, Grade 10 students of this school are offered the chance of a Work Experience placement. This involves 5 days work with an employer, undertaking the various tasks associated with their particular choice of career.

Students are required to do research on their job choice and then apply, in writing, to the School's Co-ordinator for that particular job. Staff involved in this programme ring to seek placement for these students with relevant employers. Permission is then sought from the State Work Experience Advisory Committee. All students must pay 35c insurance for Worker's Compensation cover.

This year's programme has been split into two sessions - the first week starting on the 21st of April for 23 students and the remainder of the Grade 10 students going out on the 5th of August.

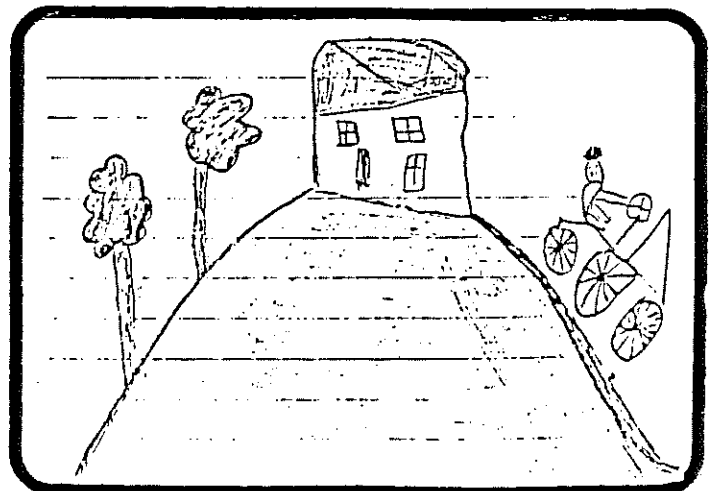

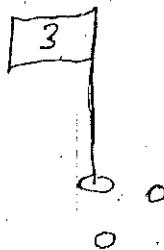

OVERPAYMENTS

A person receiving payments from Social Security has a responsibility to notify the Department of any changes in circumstances as soon as possible. Claim forms, income statements, review forms and notices issued from time to time all clearly state the events a person is obliged to tell the Department. Failure to notify changes in income or other circumstances may result in an overpayment. The Social Security Act also provides for penalties or imprisonment if a person misrepresents his or her circumstances or makes false or misleading statements.

The person is fully advised of the cause of any overpayment and details of the calculation are supplied on request.

The Department in most instances takes action to recover overpayments. The usual recovery methods are by withholdings, if the person is continuing to receive a payment, or by a cash refund from people no longer receiving payment. Repayments can also be made in instalments through Post Offices using a payment card issued by Social Security.

The proportion of the basic weekly rate of pension or benefit which is usually withheld in instalments is 14%. If this proves too difficult to repay, a suitable repayment amount can be negotiated.

The Department has the power to recover overpayments by other methods, some of which are:

- * garnishee of wages of employed debtors;
- * recovery directly from some bank accounts and accounts in other financial institutions;
- * offsetting tax refunds against Social Security payments; and
- * recovery against the assets of a debtor (including real estate).

The powers and disrections are governed by these general principles:

- * negotiation is the Department's basic debt recovery method; and
- * the rate of recovery is based on the debtor's capacity to repay.

Formal powers and legal action are only used after efforts have been made to negotiate a reasonable repayment arrangement with the debtor.
