PHOTO LICENCES ARE HERE

The familiar paper Tasmanian driver's licence will be replaced from this month with a new flush-cut laminated plastic card incorporating a head and shoulders photo of the holder.

The introduction of photo licences to Tasmania - after false starts in 1976, 1982 and 1988 - brings the State into line with mainland states and territories which have had photo licences for several years.

Photo licences are now compulsory and all motorists whose licences fall due for renewal from now on must attend an official photo point (all Tasmanian Motor Registry Offices and selected suburban and country police stations) to have their photo taken.

After presenting two acceptable items of identification, and after payment of fees, a photo will be taken and a temporary licence issued. The photo licence will be processed and mailed to the holder a few days later.

The new licence is about the same thickness of a credit card and measures 8.5 cm x 5.5 cm, so it fits easily in a wallet or purse. The face of the licence shows the holder's photo, name and address,

expiry date, licence number, date of birth and endorsements for various vehicles, eg: heavy rigid, motorcycle, etc.

With the introduction of the photo licence, motorists can now renew the licence for annual periods between one and five years. The previous longest term was three years.

The fees for the new licences are: one year \$17, two years \$28, three years \$39, four years \$50, five years \$60.

Motorists holding both a car licence and motorcycle licence will not receive two laminated photo licences. The car licence will display a motorcycle extension costing \$7 per year, additional to the car licence fee, eg: one year \$24.

The new licences are colour coded for different categories to make identification easier.

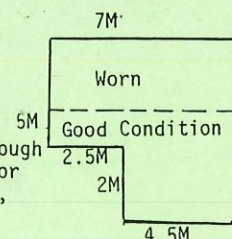

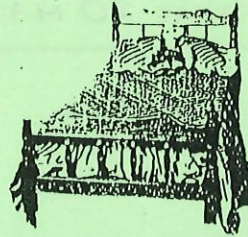

FINGAL VALLEY 1864

EXTRACT FROM WALCH'S ALMANAC

(part two)

At Avoca are two inns, two small shops or stores, a blacksmith, a carpenter and two or three shoe-makers; altogether about twelve inhabited houses and tenements. There is also a public school, conducted by Mr. Roberts (1864), and attended by about 30 children.

Leaving the township of Avoca, you proceed along a very pretty line of road towards the township of Fingal, distant eighteen miles. The road is in excellent order (1864), running parallel to the South Esk River. On the right is the St.-Paul's Tier, and on the left the towering Ben Lomond.

Soon after leaving Avoca you pass "Clifton Lodge", a cottage which is out of repair and unoccupied. Further on to the left is "Henbury", the hospitable residence of John Storey, to reach which you have to cross the river, here spanned by a good log bridge. At this valuable dairy farm, which is in admirable order, is made the justly celebrated "Storey's Cheese".

Beyond this, to the left of the road is "Ormely", the cottage of F.W.vonStieglitz; and further on is the farm of "New Prospect", in the occupation of Mr. Chas Alford, through which runs Reynolds Creek. At this point can be seen at some distance, peeping through the trees on the opposite side of the river, the dwelling house on the estate of "Garth", the property of Mr. Chas Peters of Fingal.

The road, passing through forest pasture land, crosses "Eastwood", occupied by Mr. John Wright, and soon reaches the estate of "Tullochgorum", the property of Jas. Grant, whose most hospitable residence stands in its plantations and shrubberies to the left of the road on the bank of the river, and close at the foot of "Craig eil a chie" (Rock of Defence), a precipitous rocky mount named by its Highland owner after the celebrated rock in the centre of the country of the "Clan Grant" in the "Land o' Cakes".

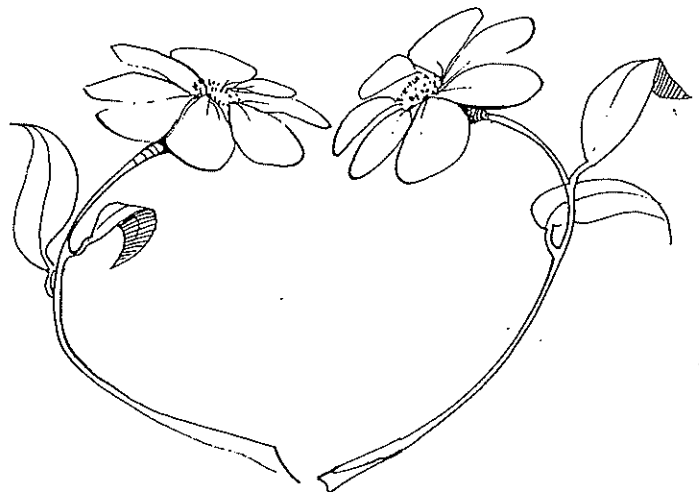

Mr Grant is justly considered "the father of the district", being one of its oldest proprietors, and now its oldest resident, to whose intelligence and energy the district is indebted for the valuable public improvements effected by the government some years by means of convict labour.

James Grant Jnr. formerly represented the district in the House of Assembly of the Colonial Legislature, but the time required for private affairs has obliged him to deprive the district of his parliamentary services.

The road continues, from this point, skirting the plain of mars land of fine quality, in which on the left the valley expands. You see on the opposite side of the river the "Marsh Farm", occupied by the Messrs. Stanfield, whose dwelling house is situated on a bank at the foot of the range, and appears through the trees, just beyond is the opening in the range, forming the nook of "Speyside", down which flows the "Tower Hill Rivulet", the Tower Hill itself, crowned with the abrupt rocky summit resembling the object from which it takes its name, forming the background.

In the valley thus formed the "Fingal Gold Field" is found, where, during the past year, about twenty persons have been working at what is called alluvial digging, earning generally about the wages of an ordinary labourer, but their operations have been confined to a very limited area, it may almost be said to one spot, viz. "Major's Creek". The general level of this valley is little above the level of the river, and at a few feet below the surface so much water filters into the shafts of the diggers for gold as to render the labour of baling it out nearly, if not quite equal to that of digging, the aid of some mechanical contrivance to effect this object is therefore indispensable to profitable digging.

PORNOGRAPHY RULED OBSCENE BY COURT

The Canadian Supreme Court has recently ruled in a landmark decision that it is legitimate for the Government to outlaw pornographic magazines and films if it could show that the "materials" degraded women, thus compromising their equality.

Proponents against pornography and its effect on society should push for similiar legislation in Australia.

The case before the Canadian Supreme Court involved the question, "What is obscene?" and the resultant decision now affirms the argument that sexual harassment and pornography are forms of discrimination against women.

The implication is that charges of obscenity in the form of pornographic magazines and films should be considered a denial of women's collective rights rather than as a matter of community standards versus individual free speech.

Canada has become the first country in the western world to recognise that the problem of pornography is the problem of women.

It recognises that if we are to have an equal society, we have to recognise the impact of violence, degrading and dehumanising material on the equality of women and children.

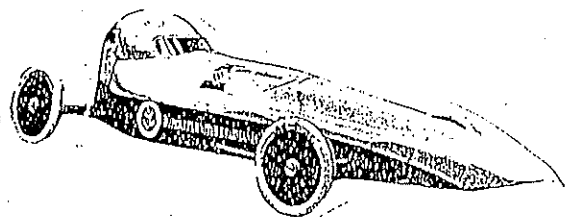
