OPENING OF PARLIAMENT

The First Session of the 42nd Parliament was opened by His Excellency the Governor, General Sir Phillip Bennett on Tuesday the 14th April at 3 pm.

However, as this is a new Parliament following a general election the opening procedures began at 11 am. when under Letters Patent His Excellency had appointed three Commissioners and directed them to call the Parliament together and on his behalf request the House of Assembly Members to be sworn in, to elect a Speaker and to be prepared for His Excellency to open the new Parliament at 3 pm.

Preceding the 11 am. opening by the Commissioners an ecumenical public church service was held at St. Davids Cathedral at 9.30 am. when representative clergy conducted worship and prayers.

As Senior Commissioner, President of the Legislative Council, and Member for Macquarie I wish it was possible for all constituents to witness the opening of the Parliament. This is not possible, and television reports must suffice for many.

The Westminster type opening Ceremony is always conducted in the Legislative Council, the Upper House. This is because the Queen, or in this case Her Representative the Governor, is above party politics and therefore never visits the Lower House (House of Assembly).

The opening is a regal affair conducted with suitable traditional pomp and ceremony.

All visitors are seated in the Legislative Council. These include such dignitaries as Supreme Court Judges, the Lord Mayor, Mayors, Clergy, spouses and friends of elected Members. Unfortunately the number able to attend is very limited.

The Governor arrives as a band plays the National Anthem. After inspecting the assembled service corps he proceeds to the Legislative Council where he takes the President's Chair and requests the House of Assembly to attend. The Usher of the Black Rod conveys the message to the House of Assembly Members who then proceed to, and take their places in, the Council.

The Governor then reads his speech (Prepared by the Government) which is an outline of the Government policy and legislative programme.

Having declared the session open the Governor leaves Parliament and Members and guests have afternoon tea. Members then return to their respective Chambers where the traditional "Address in Reply" debate begins. This is an opportunity for each Member to speak on matters of their choice. Like the Budget debate it is often called a grievance debate because Members raise matters about which their constituents are aggrieved and request the Government to take appropriate action.

The opening ceremony would no doubt be a mystery to many but behind everything there is a reason and the opening is both an historical celebration and demonstration. Our Parliamentary system is a true democracy where the "supreme power is vested in the people and is exercised by them or their elected agents under a free electoral system."

The separation of powers and the difference between the Government and the Parliament are all elements of and recognisable in the opening ceremony. Sometimes those who advocate change may not fully understand the fragile threads from which the very fabric of our democracy has been woven. **GEORGE SHAW, M.L.C.**

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

Following my letter
that was printed in the last issue
of the Valley Voice I have received
many phone calls asking about
Mother's Union, and what do we do.

May I, through your paper give
a brief description. First of all
we are not a Militant Union.
Mothers Union is a band of mothers
who have joined together to be
specially concerned with all that
strenghtens and preserves marriage
and Christian family life.

Membership is open to anyone
who has been baptised, not necessarily
an Anglican. Some branches have
United Church Ladies, some Roman
Catholics, in fact anyone who
believes. Mother's Union began
in England by Mrs Mary Sumner after
she had her first child. She
recognized that young mothers could
not always worship in a church,
but they really wanted that
spiritual guidance. They began
meeting in homes - maybe two or
three together.

Our Queen and Queen Mother are
members. In 1892 Sarah L'Oste
at an afternoon tea party talked
about the work of the Mother's
Union. From that meeting the branch
began at St. Marys, this was a
very strong group. Unfortunately
this branch was disbanded about
15 years ago and Cornwall which
was still meeting were asked to
carry on the St. Marys Cullenswood
Branch.

In the last few years all
branches have brough to the govern-
ment - both Federals and local,
the dangers of the x-rated videos
on our young, drugs in the school,
the danger of Aids, the plight of
battered wives and children.
We maintain oversea workers in
Africa, New Guinea, Pacific Islands
Fiji. These workers are very hard
working. We are only a small
voice but we know we are noticed
and listened to. These are only
a few of our projects.

PARENT STATEMENT - GENDER EQUITY

Gender equity is about social justice. It is concerned with the treatment, expectations and achievements of girls and boys. It is designed to ensure that what is being taught and learned is of equal value to both sexes. An important element involves looking at the curriculum and teaching practices to ensure that they do not disadvantage either group. It is especially important that all students realise that females and males can perform a variety of roles as citizens, workers and parents.

Many school activities have, in the past, been viewed as masculine or feminine and, accordingly, given different value and status. Boys and girls have been excluded from activities on the basis of their sex and thus denied opportunity to achieve to the limit of their potential.

Tasmanian schools and colleges are being asked to consider gender equity issues. This is in line with the National Policy for the Education of Girls in Australian Schools (1987) which confirmed that girls are not succeeding as well as boys in some areas.

The objective of policies and processes encompassed by the term 'gender equity' is to ensure that girls succeed, on average, to the same extent as boys in all fields of school endeavour.

For this to occur, changes will be needed in many traditional attitudes and ways of behaving of both boys and girls and in the ways schools operate. While the prime aim is for girls' educational opportunities to be improved, it is recognised that there will also be accompanying improvement in the education of boys.

Extensive research highlights important factors that contribute to the disadvantages girls face in schools. These include:

teachers and parents have different expectations for girls and boys in relation to behavior, subject choice, employment and intellectual success;

sex based harassment and its effect on self-esteem and learning potential;

subject content and materials which do not adequately reflect women's contributions, achievements or points of view;

inadequate or gender-biased career information;

lack of the special support and guidance afforded girls by the dearth of appropriate female role models.

Gender is central to children's sense of who they are in the world and what they might be.

Teachers and parents need to understand how girls and boys develop views of themselves, so that they can discuss gender and role issues with their children.

Through these discussions, children can be helped to recognise the impact of femininity and masculinity in their lives, their relationships and their hopes for the future. They can then cope more effectively with the limiting or contradictory messages they may receive.

Parents can do a lot to make sure that girls and boys grow up to fulfil their potential as balanced people, able to participate in all facets of life.

They can encourage and support boys and girls in participating in a wide range of experiences which will broaden their view of what is acceptably feminine or masculine. All students need to be prepared by school and family both for paid work and for the unpaid work involved in maintaining a home and rearing children.

Parents can assist schools to equip girls and boys with ways to relate to each other as equals in the school environment and in the community. Girls and boys need to have the same range of personal and social attributes.

These include:

the ability to be assertive, to listen, to be sympathetic and to relate to others; and

the ability to resolve conflict by socially acceptable means.

A Gender Equity Policy statement has been sent to all schools and colleges. A copy is available

from your school. A plan of action is being developed to assist schools address Gender Equity issues.

EXTRACT FROM WALCH'S ALMANACFINGAL VALLEY

1864

(part 4)

A few allotments on the left of the road, at a higher level than the Marsh, are cultivated, as are several to the right of the road, and extending towards the base of Ossian's Throne, which is here seen to start out in abrupt and commanding dignity.

The boundary of the township as we proceed eastward, towards Cullenswood, is the Fingal Rivulet, emerging from the Tier, to the right of which Ossian's Throne forms a member. On its bank, in this direction, are the allotments of military pensioners, most of whom have sold their land and left. The Rivulet is crossed by a small bridge of logs, supported on stone abutments, rendered necessary from its liability to rise during the winter very rapidly to too great a depth, and, with too strong a current, to be forded with safety, if at all. In this state, when the South Esk River, into which it empties itself at a short distance to the right, is also high, it overflows the Marsh, down which it rushes to the depth of several feet, and joins the river at the bridge and its embankment.

Soon after passing the rivulet, the Malahide Gate is seen to the left. Malahide House, the residence of Robert Clerk, Esq., J.P., stands at little more than a mile from the road, from which it is not visible. The proprietor of this valuable estate, the Hon. Samuel N. Talbot, is now in England, but was for many years resident here (with his uncle, the Hon. W. Talbot, one of the earliest settlers of the colony), and conciliated the highest opinion and sincere regard of all who enjoyed the pleasure of his acquaintance.

Mr. Clerk, a friend of the family, has the management of its affairs; and under his zealous and judicious direction, the wool of the season 1861 has attained to higher value than that of any other flock of Tasmania or N.S.W, the value of the whole clip, upwards of 100 bales, reaching the unusual price of nearly 3s.2d per lb.

A specimen of 200 fleeces was exhibited at the Industrial Exhibition 1862, and obtained a Prize Medal.

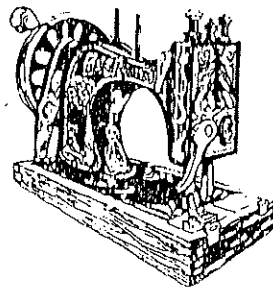
On the right of the road, at about three miles distance, is Mount Malcolm, from which the Fingal Coal is obtained, at an elevation of about 300 feet above the road; the seam is about 8ft in thickness, and the quality is good, though in burning it is said to yield rather a large proportion of fine white ash.

The traveller passes for about five miles through the Malahide Estate, by which the road is bounded on either side. On the left, some distance on, may be seen Malahide House and its gardens - the rich marsh clover land on the banks of the South Esk and Break-O'Day Rivers; which form a junction not far from the house. The view of the mountains from this point of the road to the west and north, is very fine. Ben Lomond in its full extent, the Tower Hill, Mount Saddle Back etc., stands out in bold prominence, and produce an admirable effect.

Advancing along the road, which runs through a slightly undulating pasture land, you arrive at the boundary of Frodsley, the estate of J.W. Gleadow of Launceston, and as you approach the Break O'Day River, the homestead is seen to the left, and at a short distance the residence of Mr. Richard Gleadow, standing on its bank.

The road is carried across the river on a timber bridge of some length, but in an advanced state of decay. The Break O'Day is usually a very placid stream, winding its way through level plains, which run at the base of the tiers on either hand, and are from three to five miles in width.

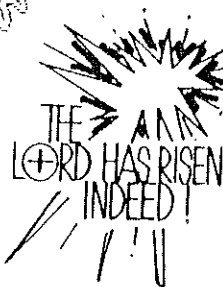

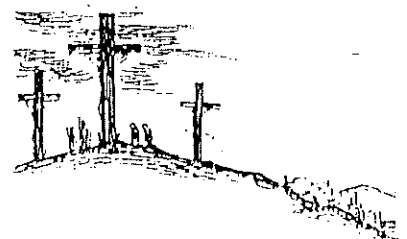
