## THE TASMANIAN COAL STORY

Coal has been a part of the history of Tasmania since settlement.

The State's first discovery of coal was made in 1793 by the French explorer Labillardiere and his party near Southport in South-East Tasmania.

Coal was later discovered on the banks of the Coal River near Pitt Water between 1803-4 and in 1809 a shipwrecked sailor discovered coal on Schouten Island, south of Freycinet Peninsular on the east coast.

The first successful coal mining operation to take place in Tasmania was the Government-run mine at Saltwater River near Port Arthur, at which production began in 1834 following the discovery of coal in Norfolk Bay.

The Tasmanian coal industry was drastically curtailed in the 1960s when industrial users converted boilers to use oil and the railways phased out steam locomotives in preference to deisels.

While coal seams had been known to occur in the Mt Nicholas area since the 1940s, no real mining occurred there until 1886 when high transport costs were reduced with the introduction of a railway line from St Marys to Conara.

Tasmanian coal is now used in a wide variety of secondary industries such as the manufacture of paper, newsprint, cement, hardboard, beer, frozen vegetables, paper pulp, domestic and industrial heating and other minor industries.

The Fingal Valley was and remains the premier coalfield in the State because of the number, extent and thickness of the seams present in the locality. The coal mines currently operating in Tasmania are run by The Cornwall Coal Company and the Merrywood Coal Company in the St Pauls Valley.

### THE CORNWALL COAL COMPANY

Mining has been virtually continuous in the Fingal Valley field since 1886 when the Cornwall Colliery near St Marys was opened by the Cornwall Coal Company. Cornwall continued to prosper in spite of competition from its neighbour and early rival Mount Nicholas Coal Company, which it eventually took over.

Employing 137 people, Cornwall currently operates two collieries and a washery to supply about 80 per cent of the Tasmanian coal market.

### MERRYWOOD COAL COMPANY

The Merrywood colliery opened in 1945.

Coal was extracted by both underground and open cut methods until 1963 when it was forced to close with the influx of cheap Middle East oil onto the Australian market.

During 1985 the mine was reopened as an open cut mine for spot sales of high quality raw coal.

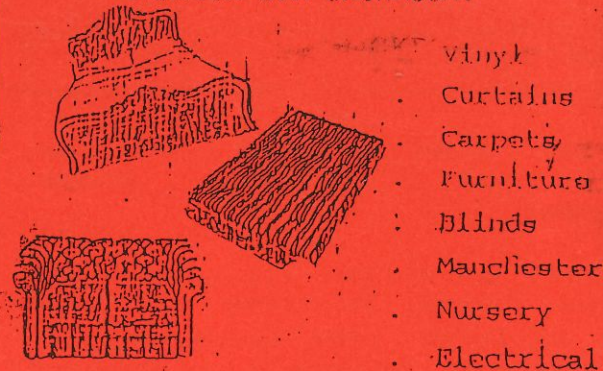

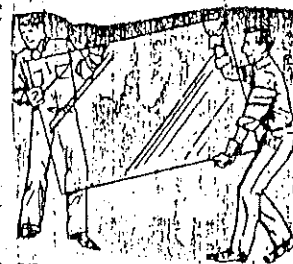

The Gomantrys stayed for tea and decided to stay on earth.

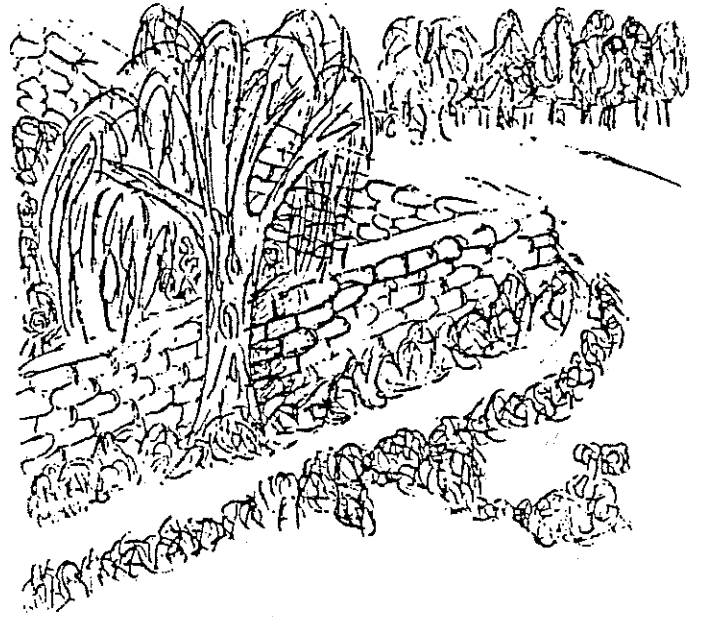

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,  
TERMINATED EMPLOYEES NEED TO BE  
VARY TO OBTAIN TAX ADVANTAGE

Employees whose jobs have been terminated and who have superannuation payments that were made before 1983 need to be aware of the requirements necessary to achieve the best tax advantages.

These new requirements will need to be met in advance if the termination lump-sum is to be taxed at concessional rates.

The lower taxation rate will only apply to the pre 1983 payments if a form known as a Determination issued by the Insurance and Superannuation Commission is included with this year's tax return. The ISC will also need the taxpayer's tax file number if the lowest tax rate is to be applied.

Employees with pre 1983 service are normally taxed on only 1/20th of that part of the termination payment. However, failure to include this determination in your return could mean that the entire Eligible Termination Payment (apart from redundancy, early retirement, and invalidity payments) being taxed as ordinary income.

The tax pack mention on page 38 that in non-exception cases tax will be charged at normal rates, but the non-exceptions are not mentioned. In three instances the requirements are not needed - a) if the retiring benefit is less than \$2,500; b) if the benefit is rolled over into another superfund; or c) if the retirement benefit is made as a result of the person's death.

Now that the battle to try and deal with the 0055 telephone numbers has taken a new turn, I suggest that Tasmanians take action and voice their concerns to the Select Committee of the Senate investigating this service.

On Monday, June 17th the Senate voted to refer the question of this service to the Select Committee into Community Standards Relevant to the Supply of Services Utilising Telecommunications Technologies. The Committee will investigate the whole question of content and standards in Telecommunication services such as 0055, Pay TV, video and computer services.

Submissions may be sent to The Secretary, (the above Committee), Parliament House, Canberra, ACT 2600.

My petition against the 0055 numbers has now reaches in excess of 10,000 and responses are still coming and are being presented to the Parliament as they arrive.

- 1/2 Teaspoon Pepper
- 1 Tablespoon Soya Sauce
- 2 Tablespoon Peanut Butter or Coconut Cream
- 1 Dessertspoon Oil
- 1 Cup Water
- 7 Diced
- 2 Potatoes                      2 Carrots
- 2 Stalks Celery      Piece Pumpkin
- 1/2 a Cauliflower
- Juice of a Lemon

## METHOD

Fry spices in hot oil for 2 minutes, stirring constantly. Add vegetables and soya sauce, add water. Simmer for 40 minutes. Add lemon juice and peanut butter or coconut. Cream and simmer for 5 minutes. Serve with rice, poppadums, omelette or meat, and banana pieces rolled in coconut.
