RE-BUILDING DEVELOPMENTS

The total picture about re-building developments is not yet clear.

However, a contract has been let to L.H.S. Constructions for immediate works. This will include converting the assembly hall into a library, converting the speech and drama room into a staff common room, the installation of a terrapin for Speech and Drama and alterations to Rooms 32 and 33.

Money has also been allocated for the re-development of the Visual Aids Room into a second science laboratory. This work is expected to follow soon after the immediate works.

LIBRARY

Perhaps our biggest task following the fire is to re-stock our library to anywhere near its previous capacity.

There has been a generous response from individuals and from other schools and communities and, this week, we will be given the opportunity to build our stocks from the resources of the State Library.

We would be most grateful for any further assistance as, inevitably, there will be gaps in our resources that will need to be filled.

RE-BUILDING UPDATE

The Department is preparing two proposals for re-building. One is to build a purpose-built library and to convert the hall (with additions) to a Speech and Drama/Music area. The other proposal is to build a purpose-built Speech and Drama/Music area and leave the library in the hall.

The cost of each proposal would be much the same and, once the proposals are prepared, the school community will be given the opportunity to indicate their preference.

BLACKWOOD PLANTATION

Friday, 2nd August was a very exciting day. Students from Prep to Grade 6 planted 185 blackwood trees on part of the school farm adjacent to Gray Road.

The day started with a typical St. Marys fog but the fog and cold were soon forgotten as class after class made the journey to the paddock to plant trees. The enthusiasm of the students was infectious (no hint of slave labour here!) and certainly impressed the visitors who came to watch and report on the day's activities (Julian Ridgers and an A.B.C. T.V. crew; Alan Gray from Greening Australia; Ross Jones, the Education Department Landcare Officer and Jane Becker, the Northern Landcare officer).

The media interest in our planting was quite staggering and I am sure the news items on A.B.C. radio and the excellent coverage on A.B.C. T.V. news on Sunday night gave the school some excellent publicity and provided a much needed boost to staff and students following the depression of the fire.

The "Examiner" and "Tas. Country" will each run an article in the next couple of weeks.

The day was an unqualified success and the school now has a wonderful resource which will have aesthetic appeal, landcare value and perhaps provide a financial return in the long term.

Thank you to all primary staff for their co-operation and help; Howard, Todd and Debbie for their assistance, and especially the students who have given their school a legacy of which they can feel very proud.

ST. MARYS STATE SCHOOL

Mr. Herbert James Smith, teacher. The school house is an old fashioned building, divided into two fairly large rooms, and the teacher's residence is a detached four-roomed cottage standing in its own grounds. The number of scholars on the roll is ninety-five, and the average daily attendance is about eighty. When Mr. Smith took charge of the school, about seven years ago, the number of pupils on the roll was only about sixty, so that good progress has been made, and it is evident that Mr. Smith's abilities as a teacher are recognised and that confidence is felt in the general management of the school. Mr. Smith was born at Kingston, Brown's River, in 1864, and was educated at the Battery Point (Model) State School, where he gained the distinction of being the first student nominated to the Model School, which carried with it the means of obtaining a thorough equipment for his future profession. His first appointment was to the State School at Mangana, and from there he was promoted to his present charge. Mr. Smith is W.M. of the Lord Carrington Lodge, Fingal, Lieutenant in command of the Cornwall Company, 2nd Battalion Tasmanian Regiment of Infantry, and takes interest in most local matters. He was married in 1896 to Miss Harriet Viney, daughter of Mr. Robert Viney, Fingal.

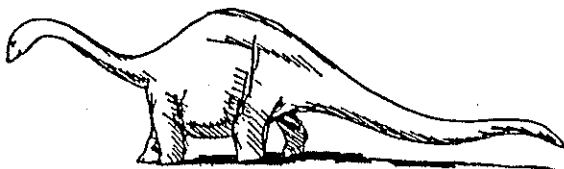

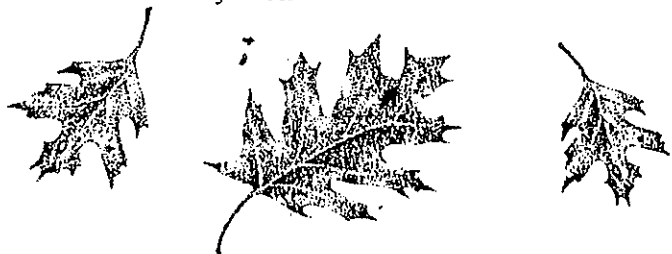

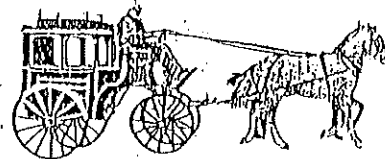
