St Marys Football Club Inc Annual General Meeting was held at the St Marys Hotel on Friday the 14 of June 1996.

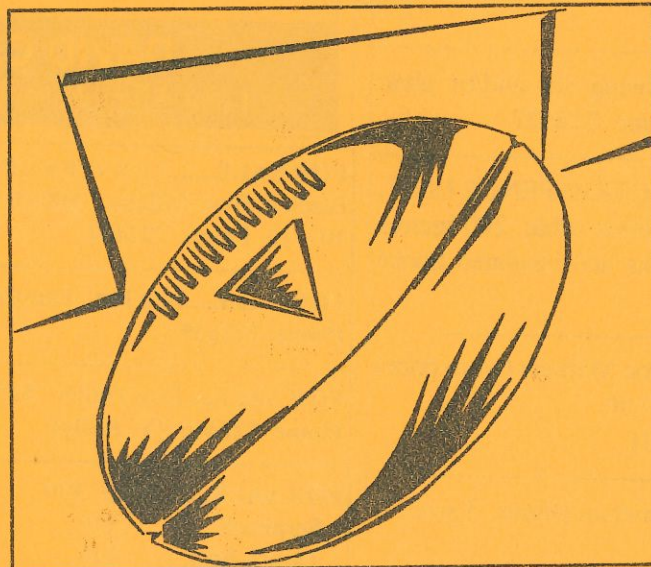

The Scheme defines only five zones and sets out what type of uses and developments can occur in those zones. The zones are:

- 1 Resource management
- 2 Rural Resource
- 3 Urban
- 4 Industrial
- 6 Commercial

The Planning Scheme is on view at the St Helens Council Chambers from 17 June - 8 July. Planning Scheme Consultants are available at the St Marys Library Thursday 27 June 10 - 5, Fingal Council Chambers Friday 28 June, 10 - 5 and St Helens Council Chambers Wednesday 26 June 10 - 5.

New chooks should arrive beginning of term 2 we'll need feeders-egg collectors over summer.

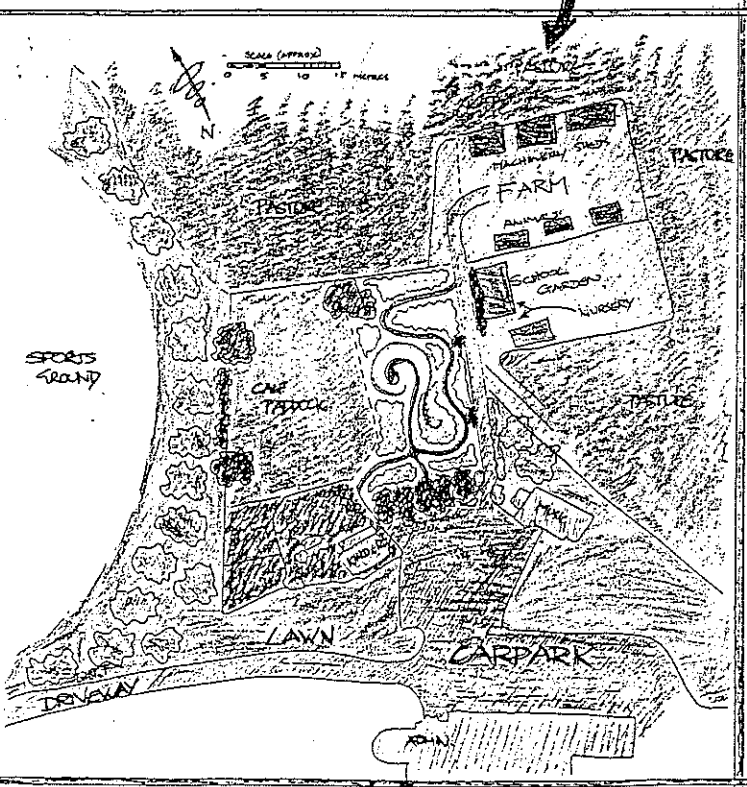

YOUNG COUCH POTATOES

A staggering 15 to 30 per cent of Australian children are overweight and the figures are rising annually. The only way to stave off obesity in older children is by teaching sensible eating and exercise patterns when they are as young as four and five.

HANDY HINTS!

Resist the temptations! Supermarkets make most of their money on non-essential items - their selling strategy depends on enticing you to buy items you hadn't planned.

Write a list and stick to it, and remember if you are the slightest bit hungry those yummy looking and expensive doughnuts might prove irresistible.

Shop at supermarkets rather than corner stores.

Try and leave the kids with friends: You can look after their children when they shop. It's amazing what you can achieve when you're not having to watch what the kids load into the trolley.

Timing: Shop as close to closing time on Saturday as possible to catch the end-of-week specials.

Stick with your shopping list except where you pass a special on a staple food. Then buy as many as you can afford.

Buy groceries fortnightly or monthly to avoid frequent visits to the shops.

Grow your own vegetables.

Cut lunches for school and work.

Shop for specials and best

priced items.

Convenience vs fresh: Convenience foods may be fine when you are working long hours and earning heaps, but when the balance is the other way around, opt for foods that require more input from the cook - they are cheaper.

Fresh food is not only better for your health, but also your wallet. Buy what is in season - put off the strawberry soufflé until strawberry season.

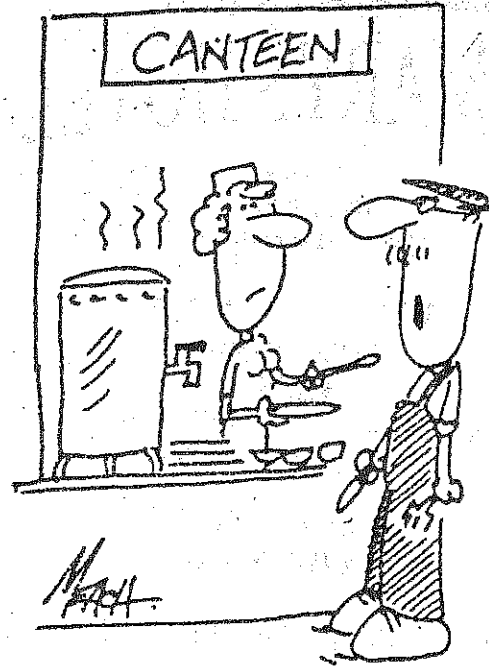
Tomatoes are one example of a fruit-vegetable that are fine to cook with, even when ripe.

Junk mail: There is a reason for those slips of paper some consider to be only a nuisance.

Keep an eye on advertisements as a basic item you need for a dinner party might be on special at a supermarket other than your regular one.

Also, discount vouchers are worth collecting for the occasional take-away treat.

Home brands: Be judicious about these. Yes, they are usually cheaper! but check their weight

How can plants be fed **WITHOUT** chemical fertilisers?

Organic growers do not feed their plants, they feed and enrich the soil. To do this, large amounts of organic matter are essential. This allows plants to take up nutrients and moisture in the most balanced way, while they are growing. However, when highly soluble, and sometimes volatile, chemical fertilisers are used regularly and indiscriminately, the essential balance within the soil becomes disrupted. Moulds, fungi and other micro organisms are either destroyed or quickly die out. Eventually the soil becomes powdery, lifeless and nothing more than an inert means of supporting plants.

The alternatives to chemical fertilisers include animal manures, blood and bone, fish waste, green manure, home-made and exhausted mushroom compost, seaweed, worm casts and the fully decayed remains of anything which was once alive. Many organic fertilisers, apart from poultry manures, are relatively slow acting and low in some nutrients.

Almost all are bulky with organic matter, making them perfect for the development of a balance of living things within the soil. Once this starts to occur, soil structure and drainage improve. Other important sources of organic matter are leaves, lawn clippings, straw, hay, wilted weeds and other garden debris. All can be safely supplemented with a range of natural and treated minerals or pulverised rocks.

LANDCARE NEWS

Regrettably the Break O'Day River Care Project submitted for funding in March of this year has been unsuccessful. This was a large project requiring \$52 000 in the first year to form a management strategy for the Break O'Day River and its tributaries.

In order to receive National Landcare Programme funding for 1996-97 the project had to be assessed by the Tasmanian Landcare Assessment Panel and they wrote to say that "the project was not recommended because it was seen to duplicate the work being carried out by the Break O'Day Landcare and Waterwatch facilitator, and more work was needed to be done to plan and develop a Rivercare/Catchment Management Strategy before funding a large resource assessment component.

While your project will not receive NLP funds, we hope it will not be the end of the project and could we encourage your group to continue to develop the project and look to other alternative funding opportunities that could be available through other government programmes, community organisations and sponsorships and even reapply next year.

As a start your project has been forwarded to landcare Australia Ltd and the State Landcare Foundation to see if they may be able to find a sponsor or funds for the project, but funds are likely to be limited in this area."

So what has the Break O'Day River Care management been doing? Very little indeed, as some members felt we could sit back till the money rolled in, somehow failing to see that with the new government in power money for landcare projects would dry up until that 1/3 of Telstra was sold. There was still some money in the National Landcare kitty some \$900,000 for Tasmania, but this is a drop in the bucket with \$5 million worth of applications submitted for '96-'97. Also all LEAP funded schemes are drawing to a close.

Landcare/Waterwatch facilitator's position is to be increased to full-time? Currently he is paid for 12 hours work per week funded jointly from NLP and Waterwatch funding with Break O'Day Council paying for equipment, vehicle use and office facilities and will spend most of his time this term at St Marys School setting up the Waterwatch testing programme with staff and students.

So where to from here, do we still go ahead with the project - go it alone, taking longer, expecting everyone to help out, or do we drop it in the too hard basket and leave the problems to future generations? What about the cost? What is the cost? you may well ask. Whether we get involved, or pretend our problems are exaggerated and do nothing, there is always a cost! No matter which way we go there is always a cost, so stop and consider the benefits of getting involved. You may do your own landcaring, but a group getting together to solve problems is stronger and gains much more.

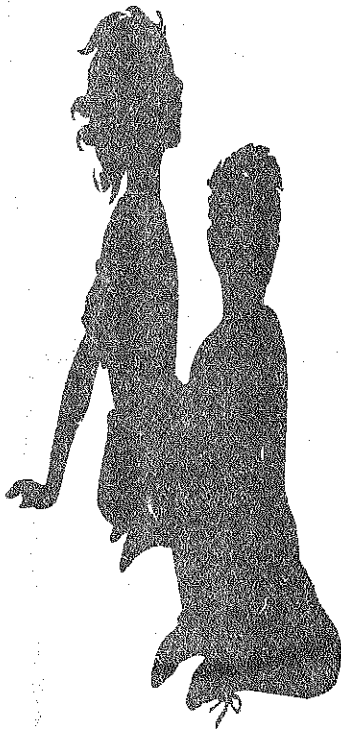

Aboriginal Place Names

Story to Tell

"Every corner of the earth has a story to tell; every hill, every valley, every river and plain, every tree and every blade of grass," wrote Ridgwell Cullum in "The Hooded Man."

Especially does this apply to Tasmania, whose story abounds with early historical associations that link us to far-distant past when the sable natives were the only human beings that ranged the unbroken forest, or trod the ever-changing seashore, all unaware of the impending and peaceful existence. It would take volumes to tell the story of the lost Tasmanian race from the discovery of the island to the deaths of the last Tasmanian aborigines - William Lanne (King Billy) on 3 March, 1869 and Queen Trucaninni (Lallarookh) on 8 May, 1976. But their sad tale has left posterity an influence for good, and of their language we have much to remind us in the nomenclature of place names in the State - Boobyalla (meaning a seaside wattle tree), Bungana (chief) Conara (coal), Emita (sand), Eugena (eaglehawk), Kaoota (dog), Lawitta (fern), Lebrina (house), Legana (fresh water), Legunia (covering or dress), Lemana (oak), Lenah (kangaroo), Leprena (hut), Liena (fire in bush), Loira (coal dust), Lottah (gum tree), Lowana (girl), Magra (a day), Malbina (wild drake), Moogara (a day), Moonah (gum tree), Moltema (to run), Montumana (rivulet), Murdunna (stars), Milabena (oposum), Neika (hill), Narracoopa (good), Oldina (snow), Pelverata (ear), Penna (man), Pootark (cave), Powranna (snake), Remine (flower), Riana (white man), Relbia (long way or time), Robigana (swan), Rowella (elbow), Talawa (rain), Targa (cry), Temma (hut), Toiberry (ashes), Tyenna (Bandicoot), Tarrana (wallaby), Wielangata (large timber), Weetah (moon), Winnaleah (fire), Wybia (swan), Wyena (small timber). Would that we had loved them more!
