The last time I saw Jimmy was, I guess, his final leave, looking resplendent in naval uniform.

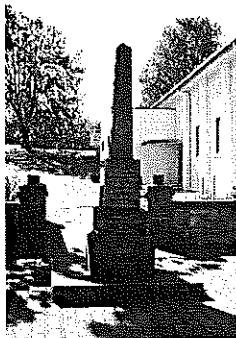

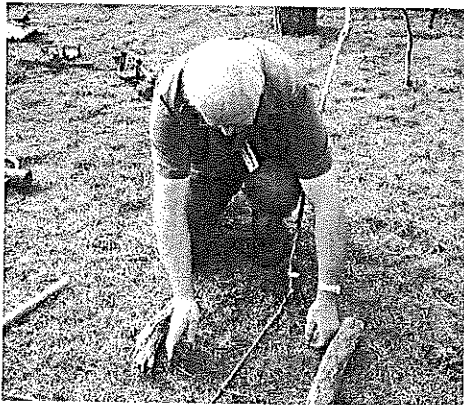

On Saturday the 19th April, the St Patricks Head and Esk Valley Historical Society Inc., as part of the Tasmanian Heritage Festival, held a demonstration day at the old St Marys Railway Station History and Gifts. We chose the theme "Early Hunting and Bush Survival", as these skills were very much a part of our heritage.

Indeed, our early settlers and even our grandparents, in hard times like the 1930's depression, relied heavily in catching game in order to have meat on the table.

The event, which was enhanced by the Grassy Bottom Regional Arts Market and local musicians,

Ian and Rita Summers, saw some two hundred people pass through over the course of the day. They were not only treated to plenty of

interesting things to see, but were given a comprehensive demonstration on snaring, trapping and

general bush survival skills by Society President, Barry Aulich, and Committee Member, Owen Hughes, both of whom had extensive experience in bush skills as boys growing up on farms in Irishtown and Chain of Lagoons.

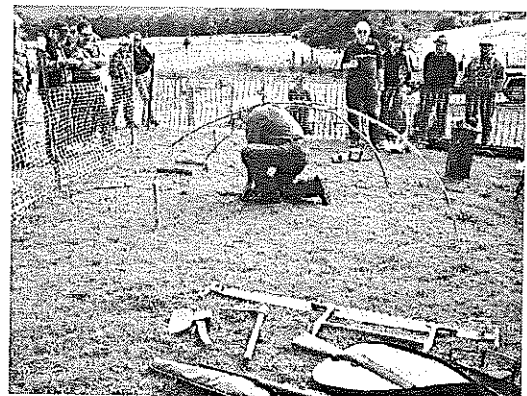
To add to the heritage side of the day, an excellent display of memorabilia from the Fingal Rifle Association was on display inside the Railway Station. This included the coveted Hoad Cup, the Blunstone Shield, a .303 rifle and many bits and pieces connected to the once popular sport of rifle shooting.

The Society would like to sincerely thank all the people who contributed to the day, with a special mention to the those who were kind enough to lend the rifle club artefacts as well as the couple of old bushies who brought along several different kinds of rabbit traps for display, one of which was almost as rare as a hen's tooth.

Last, but not least, thanks to our raffle donors and all the tickets buyers. The raffle raised \$421, which will more than cover the day's expenses. The remainder will go towards preserving our precious Valley history.

Many of these young players come from places that do not have senior footy any more. For that reason there isn't, of course, any under 16's footy either.

Luckily for some kids though, their parents are in a position to be able to take them elsewhere, nearest point St Helens, for that chance. These are the exception though.

Remember the past days? In the FDFA era there were 18 teams playing every Saturday in 6 local towns. Most families went to the football to watch 3 games over the day. Sadly this concluded in 1992 with the demise of that association.

For a few seasons however, St Marys and Fingal continued along the same lines in other comps. This of course concluded for St Marys when the club finally folded a few seasons ago. Fingal Valley continues currently but with no provision within NTFA Division 2 for Junior weekend football. This really is a terrible shame.

A former very experienced footballer and now supporter of local footy suggested to me recently that perhaps High Schools could become aligned to the eight clubs comprising NTFA Div 2, and in turn provide a launching pad for more locally retained players.

The added benefit would be that these kids could play regularly, closer to home, and support ongoing development of the wider club.

As magnificent as Auskick is, and it truly is that, it can only take kids so far due to age and so on. If there was a really local avenue for the kids to play those extra couple of years while still at school, it would be fantastic for everyone.

Surely AFL TAS administrators need to seriously look at and encourage rural junior footy wherever they can, and give EVERY kid the chance to play the game they love for as long as possible.

DOING THE ROUNDS

"The location of the skate park at Scamander has been voted on and put to rest. I hope, this project can now move forward, as well as the Surf Life Saving project. Good luck to both of these worthwhile organisations in their endeavours".

This appeared in last months "Doing the Rounds" and I believe that most of the other Councillors thought that too. I believe that my March (doing the rounds) statement was correct and it was only the small detail of Council permission for the Skate Park to begin construction. Mayor Legge at the April meeting moved a motion granting the skate park permission to commence work.

Council has a new policy on Questions without notice that is, questions are to be recorded in the minutes. A good step forward in keeping the communication lines open.

Clr McGiveron withdrew his motion regarding the speed limit in Fingal, but indicated that he might reintroduce it at a later date.

The George Keri sculpture at the St Marys Railway Station is getting a fence and some paving too. It will look a grand sight for the town and tourists when it is finished.

The Mayor moved a motion to raise funds for the Main Street make over by selling some of the vacant block of land on the corner of Groom and Storey Streets. This will be divided so that 4 building lots can be cut off and sold. The rest will be left as is; I think that this is a waste, but the majority rules by 5 votes to 4.

The Community Development Officer successfully recommended that the Council install \$5000 of outdoor gym equipment on the St Helens foreshore, from the Sport and Recreation budget. The idea is to allow people using the walking track to use the exercise equipment as they take in the beauty of the Bay.

During the last month Clr Clement, The Works Manager and I had a look at the Mathinna Main Street and some of the problems that they have indicated. 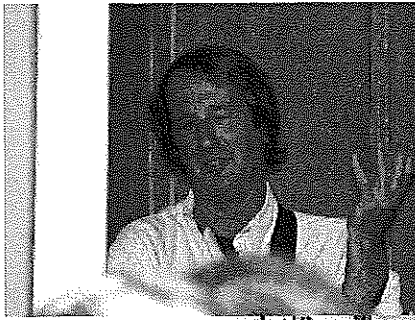

Macca took this as a cue to summarise and went on at great length while the old bloke stayed on the phone. The only thing you could hear was a rosella cackling in the background at the old blokes mountain home and you had to wonder whether it would turn up on the menu as well. The silence ended with Macca giving the old bloke the bums rush and playing Australian Idyll till the news came on.

I was going to ask him about this incident at the Golf Club but his wife told me that they were about to drive back to Bicheno in the dark. Down the Elephant late at night he was bound to see several wombats in the headlights of the G'Day Van and he didn't need me to freshen the memory. I and all the listeners who heard the silence knew exactly what he would be thinking about when he spotted a wombat.

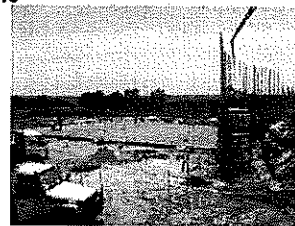
What's Happening at White Sands?

BARNETT TO SURVEY REGIONAL TASMANIA CENTRES ON MOBILE COVERAGE

Senator Guy Barnett said last week he would seek feedback from Next G mobile service users in regional parts of Tasmania to test the CDMA shut down on April 28.

"I have doubts that the Next G mobile service and coverage is now ready to replace CDMA in light of the Rudd Government's decision to axe the CDMA service in two weeks, and there's enough feedback to reinforce that fear," Senator Barnett said.

"I suspect there will be customers left grappling with a poor service and coverage well beyond Minister Stephen Conroy's April 28 shut down," he said.

Senator Barnett plans to survey parts of the North East, Central Highlands, the Huon, West Coast, Northern and Southern Midlands and East Coast to gain feedback.

"Of course we need Ministerial assurances that the April 28 changeover will be successful, but let's also hear from the people affected," Senator Barnett said.

"I am still being contacted with complaints about the Next G service, and I cannot see the service undergoing such a miraculous transformation in the next few days," he said.

"Minister Stephen Conroy must reveal the number of Tasmanians still on the CDMA service. He also must release the advice he has received about concerns as to CDMA and the Next G replacement, along with Telstra's responses that have satisfied the Rudd Government concerning an April 28 deadline.

"This is an essential service. It's not just an issue for business and recreational users. It also affects people in remote areas with health concerns. A reliable service is critical to them," Senator Barnett said.

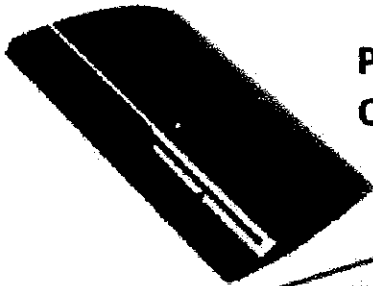

Gorse — Time to take Action →

A Gorse Field Day was recently held in St Mary's which was well attended by gorse 'enthusiasts'.

Key presenters David Lane, Regional Weeds Officer with the Department of Primary Industries and Water, and Greg Stewart, Weeds Coordinator for NRM North, gave very informative presentations emphasising the importance of Best Practice Gorse Management techniques, with a focus on cost effectiveness. These are outlined below.

The sad truth is that in many areas is that gorse is here to stay ... it would take a massive effort, millions of dollars and several decades to rid the Fingal valley of gorse. But that does not mean it cannot be contained, and its impact reduced, by a coordinated effort and appropriate techniques.

Here are some of the most important points to bear in mind when planning a gorse control program:

*Gorse seeds can remain in the soil for up to 30 years, so gorse control is never a one-off effort. Rules 1, 2 & 3 are follow-up, follow-up and follow-up!

*There is no 'best method' of gorse control: in fact, many methods are very effective if carried out appropriately and followed up. The methods you choose will depend on the size of the infestation, its situation, and the resources you have available.

*A good rule of thumb, if you plan to use herbicide, is to reduce the bulk of the plants using another method first, then spray re-growth. So you could burn, bulldoze or mechanically mulch one year, and spray regrowth the next. This means you will use much less herbicide and it will be more effective.

*Many people have commented that burning is ineffective, as they have seen regrowth in burnt areas. This is a misconception. Burning is effective for reducing the bulk and allowing spot-spraying of re-growth. It is also effective in germinating the 'seed bank' so that plants can be controlled, rather than seed staying in the soil for decades. However, this means that follow-up within 2 years is absolutely essential, or the problem will be worse than when you started.

*For small infestations, or where gorse is amongst native vegetation, cutting gorse plants off at the stem and 'painting' the stump with herbicide, whilst a very prickly job, is effective ... but don't forget the follow-up...

Spring and Autumn, when plants are actively putting on new growth, are the best times for gorse control.

An outcome of the Gorse Field Day was to focus on a coordinated community approach when dealing with the gorse. This will assist with funding applications, mapping and prioritising areas of gorse and educating and demonstrating to community members how simple it is to take action.

On the 31st of March the ENE team went to Scottsdale for a swimming carnival.

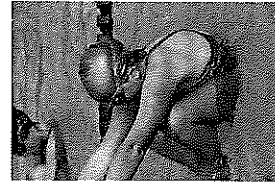
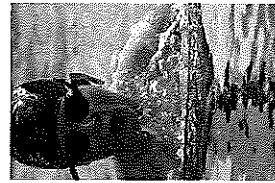
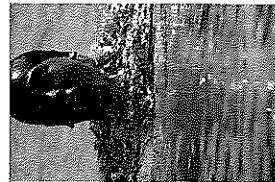
We had in our team students from St Marys District High, St Helens District High, Fingal, Bicheno and Avoca Schools.

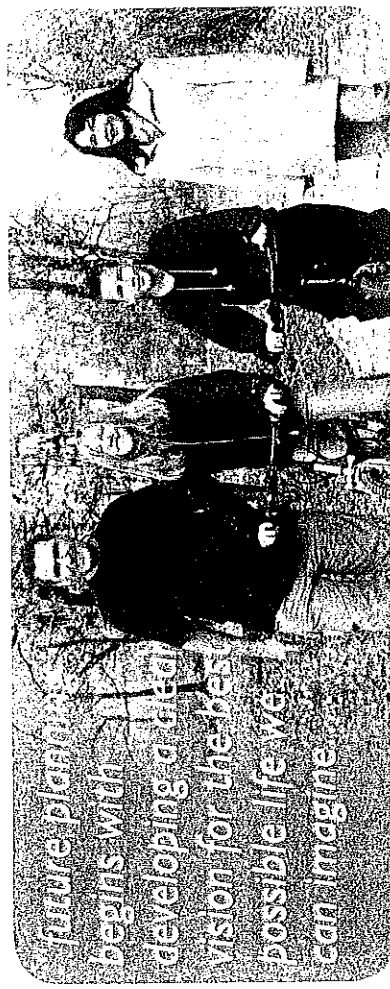
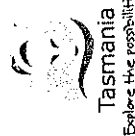
