## HYDATIDS CAN KILL!

The incidence of new cases of hydatid disease in humans has been reduced by more than half in the past nine years.

There were five new surgical cases of the disease in humans in the twelve month period to December, 1974 compared with six in 1973.

However, another five people were readmitted for further surgery. All of them had previously had operations for the removal of hydatid cysts.

One patient underwent surgery in February and again in April.

One man, a 67 year old retired farmer, died as a result of multiple hydatid cysts of the liver.

These figures were released recently by the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council which has been conducting a survey for the Director of Public Health since 1966.

One patient was only 6½ years old and had lived in a town all her life. Two other patients were teenage girls of 14 and 19. In three 3-year groups, over the past 9 years, the incidence of new cases fell from 42 (1966-68) to 24 (1969-71) and again 18 (1972-74).

The Secretary of the Tasmanian Hydatids Eradication Council, Mr. J.T. Pickmore, said that the drop in incidence in humans over the nine years from 42 new cases to 18 was the most encouraging sign to the Council, whose aim was the eradication of the disease. He said that undoubtedly the dramatic progress of the campaign as regards the drop in incidence in dogs, sheep and humans, was due to the efforts of the Department of Agriculture and all those concerned with the job of educating the public on the dangers of the disease and its methods of prevention.

Cases came from Fern Tree, Copping, Oatlands, Devonport, Chigwell, George Town, Launceston and Latrobe.



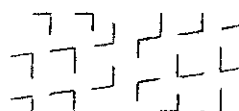

GARDENING NOTES

AUTUMN

Dig and pot enough herbs to fill your kitchen window sill for winter this year. Marjoran, parsley, lavender rosemary and oregano will not stand a cold winter outside, chives can also be potted and you have it handy when wanted.

Mulch the beds in the garden with old hay if you can get it, or sawdust, this will keep the temperature even, it's the frost melting and freezing over and over which does so much damage, so put your garden to bed for the winter. Use bags of any kind, paper, cloth or plastic makes a good nightshirt to put over late ripening fruits or frost tender shrubs, a handful of hay put on top of a shrub is good too.

HEALTH NOTES

Last weeks Womans Day featured an article on fasting, which I think represents a major step forward for people who feel the need for some recognition of what are otherwise thought to be primitive customs.

Fasting is a wonderful experience, extremely beneficial to the "body and the mind" (A coupling too little recognised these days).

Short fasts fairly regularly (say 1-2 days each fortnight) are more beneficial than long ones to begin with in fact until your body is used to fasting long fasts (i.e. 6-7 days) can be harmful.

Fasting is especially beneficial during sickness, giving the stomach and digestive organs a rest, the energy otherwise required to digest can be utilised for recuperation. Note the way animals when sick stop eating and lie around until better.

Fasting is an invigorating and refreshing exercise promoting strength of will and extreme clarity of mind.

For those who feel they cannot cope with no snacks, pure fruit juice (i.e. squeezed fruit not packaged or bottled pretend stuff) is quite acceptable and remember drink plenty of water whilst fasting.

Recipies For Good HealthT.V. Sweets

Melt 4 oz. butter and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup honey over gentle heat in saucepan. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup skim milk,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup raw peanuts (or other nuts)  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup coconut,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup sultanas,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup wheat germ,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup lecithin. Stir well adding a little more of any ingredient if mixture isn't thick enough. Pour into shallow container and chill well. Cut into chunks to serve.

Vegetable in White Sauce

Gently cook chopped mixed vegetables in a pot with a little water. Make up white sauce by gently frying 1 chopped onion in 3 oz. butter. Add  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup whole meal flour,  $\frac{1}{2}$  powdered milk and pour in water from vegetable to make the sauce. Add more water if needed; then melt in some chopped up cheese.

"JUST YARNIN'"

It occurred to me that since it is so fashionable to give an attractive piece of Australian coastline a good saleable name we may as well use "Medibanks" for the Falmouth area, for even now doctors like to vegetate here, and during last centry several of them occupied properties in this district. No doubt even then other peoples illnesses drove the weary medicos to seek some isolated and peaceful home far from city crowds.

In 1829, Dr. John Henderson on a holiday from his practice in India visited Falmouth by coastal vessel, and then returned on horseback to select 2,650 acres, naming his grant "Huckamabad", which is now 'Glenco'. After only a year in Australia this doctor returned to India, our very healthy coast-land having presumably improved his condition more readily than had anticipated.

By December 1829 William Steel was granted 2410 acres next door to 'Glenco' at what was first named "William's Wood", then "Thompson's Villa", and finally "Enstone Park". While bringing the machinery for a flour mill into George's Bay in 1830 William was drowned, after which his farm was leased by Doctor Henry Cowell for 14 years, before he moved to Cullenswood. Both William Steels sons married daughters of Doctor Cowell-Michael marrying Emma Charlotte, and the younger brother John chose Frances who had been born at Falmouth on Xmas day 1844.

Henry Cowell had come to Launceston as a young graduate shortly before "Thompson's Villa" was located to the Steels, then when the place was advertised on a clearing lease he and his family moved to Falmouth. Owing to very dry conditions on the coast he was glad to take over the lease of "Cullenswood House" from Colonel Legge later, and finally he moved to Lyttleton Street in Launceston.

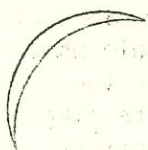
It is said that the little stone house in Falmouth where Bill Panton and his missus lived was built for the doctor who was responsible for the health of the soldiers and convicts while the Pass was being made.

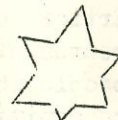
Doctor Alexander Thomson as surgeon on convict transports had visited Australia several times before he settled in Tas. with his family in 1832.
