YOU & THE LAW

I have previously, on several occasions in this column, made mention of "Dogs at large" and I again prompted to touch this subject once again in the hope that something constructive will be done by dog owners, to restrict their dogs to public places and from annoying others.

Let me first say that during the past week three dogs have been killed in the St. Marys township area, ran over by passing motorists. Apart from losing a valuable or treasured animal, the accident could have been more serious.

It could easily have resulted in a tragic accident for the driver or passengers. Dogs roaming at large are a common nuisance and in particular a hazard when they are on the roads.

Maybe the appointment of a dog Ranger this week by the Fingal council will help in clearing up straying dogs. So if your dog is allowed to roam about, without control, and it goes missing, then I suggest you look for it through the new dog Ranger and he undoubtedly will be pleased to see you, so that you can be prosecuted.

The law is quite explicit in that no dog is permitted to roam from the owners property unless it is under the control of its owner or some adult person.

I am hoping that with the assistance of the New Ranger that the problem will be solved. It's up to you now, either you look after your dog or have it impounded. Prosecution can be avoided so it's your decision.

FISHING NEWS

St. Helens Surf Angling Club has come to life with a list of four fixtures for the next four months. First one will be held next Sunday (14th September) at Swincart from 12 noon to 5 p.m. Scamander Angling Club will meet at Wrinklers beach on Sunday 28th Sept from 12 noon to 4 p.m. Salmon appear to be reasonably plentiful at present and good catches have been reported. Fishing at four mile last week, I tried a new technique with some success. There was a moderate sea running with some drift and an appreciable undertow. After casting, I wound the brake right off and allowed the undertow to take sinker (3 ozs) and hooks out to sea. This method is not recommended if the beach is crowded and would not be suitable for a well-known Scamander Angler who always leaves his line in the water, while he takes an hour or so for lunch. He would find his line cut when he returned. Scamander angling club committee is talking of holding a casting competition both for distance and accuracy. This will be advertised as soon as details have been worked out.

AWARDS TO MIDSON'S

Club history was made when brothers Phillip and Trevor Midson won the best and fairest awards for the St. Marys Football Club. Phillip, 20 started in the back pocket throughout the season and dominated the voting with 75 votes—scoring 20 number three votes. Runner-up was vice Captain Leslie Newman with forty-two votes, third Captain Greg Tapp with 28 votes and John Schier 21 votes in fourth place.

COMFREY CONTINUED (Cont from last edition)

Comfrey in Agriculture

Wilted Comfrey is balanced just right for potatoes, and any potash demanding crop. For potatoes use 400-500 grams of wilted leaves every half metre in a trench. Then cover with an inch of soil, plant seed potatoes, and fill in with 12 centimetres of soil. I grew very robust sweet corn on a trench of comfrey leaves.

Manure tea: Add cold water to a bucket half filled with chopped leaves. Leave for a week to draw. In one English experiment it improved growth of greenhouse tomatoes when fed in time for their first truss of fruit, when they were hungry for potash.

Maintenance: Dress with dried poultry manure (or litter) in the Spring. Comfrey is hungry for nitrogen—it can even take fresh manure droppings from any source. In the autumn dust with lime-dolomite for preference.

GARDENING NOTES

Your soil may be well fertilised with all sorts of things yet be unbalanced, so that it is unable to make use of trace elements which are there, if the plants vigor is impaired, this makes it susceptible to plant diseases and insect pests. Copper for instance is known to be necessary to give plants resistance to fungus diseases, but if the soil is unbalanced then the copper may be there but the plant is unable to use it.

Insect pests and weed invasions of our gardens and farms is at once a signal of help, and plants needs, they are only attracted when the soils are badly treated, they need humus and mulches at once. So how is your compost heap coming on? Or have you any old hay to lay around your plants? Have you noticed how the worms work with old hay on the ground? Or other mulches? They hatch by the dozen! This is good, it shows the soil has help to be healthy, this grows good vegetables to help people be healthy. A lot of our food today is unbalanced so that quite a few people who eat such things, often suffer from malnutrition, as the food grown is on unbalanced soils, so there is less protein more insect pests, more sprays to upset the ecology, and less nourishment for the plants to grow healthy.

Preventing disease is essential to health, but there is no reason why we should miss the adventure of trying to find a wholeness and harmony in life which is a real thrill. Each advance in our level of health is an opportunity to live life more thoroughly. If you look at a forest all the leaves and twigs lay on the top of the ground, no one tries to dig anything under, and nothing is disturbed so seedlings grow well and so do trees, the worms take mulch underneath as needed.
