## EDITORIAL

The following inscription is on a large statue of Truganinni which stood on the beach of Lake Pedder overlooking the lake itself and which lies beneath the waters of the original lake pedder.

"When we reflect on the beauty and dignity of Truganinni, we must deplore the destruction of her people. Let us then reflect on the beauty of this lake. Dedicate it to the memory of Truganinni and her people and resolve to keep it unspoiled for the benefit of mankind".

As early as 1967 organisations from all over Australia and the world, were requesting the saving of Lake Pedder. Sir Edmund Hillary asked that the area be preserved as it was the best walking country he had ever seen. Peter Scott Chairman of the World Wildlife Fund London cabled the Labour Premier of the day Mr. Reece the following quote.

"Much concern is felt in individual conservation circles by reports that Lake Pedder is to be subject to a Hydro Electric scheme in spite of its National Park status. It is becoming widely recognised that progress in civilisations may be better served by maintaining the integrity of National Parks than by destroying or damaging these through industrial development or short term expediency. This view commands increasing popular support as world opinion more widely accepts the respon-

sibility of this generation as trustees for those that follow. Your decision on Lake Pedder will be awaited anxiously in many countries, and I hope your government will not forget the long term ethical, aesthetic and cultural value which may conflict with immediate economic considerations."

### HAS THE GOVERNMENT LEARNT A LESSON ?

When one thinks that cries to preserve Lake Pedder reached the ears of UNESCO and was listed for preservation by the United Nations as being world wide significance, can we, the community escape some sort of blame for apathy ? Can our government say it has not been apathetic about our beautiful island? Tasmania abounds in so much natural beauty that we surely are the envy of many countries. It is time the government took a much closer look at what it is doing to our island state, and indeed it is far overdue for the H.E.C. TO be completely open in every detail of its proposed activities. Twenty years ago an H.E.C. engineer announced that after the Gordon scheme there was to be an H.E.C. scheme for the Huon river, yet so far the public have heard nothing, what does the Government know of such a possible scheme ? What of our beautiful River Gordon? Anyone who has travelled along its deep quiet waters and seen the magnificent scenery will shudder at the thought of desecrating one of God's masterpieces, can any river be



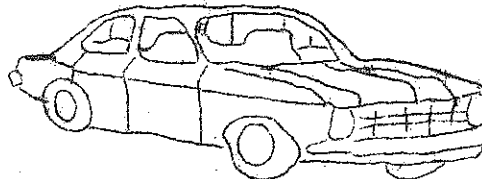

## FISHING :



Bad weather caused the cancellation of St. Helens Game Fishing Club Rally on 27/28th. March as conditions on the barway were unsafe for small boats. Several private charter parties since then have reported bluefin catches averaging 20 - 30 lb. So far this season, no big blue-fin have been landed off St. Helens. The 87 lb yellowfin caught by Maurice Brooker not only created a club record but exceeded the State record 12lb & an application for recognition has been lodged. A party from Hobart sighted at least seven Marlin but could not persuade them to take a bait. Michael Tucker hooked one but lost it. Next club rally will be held next Sunday (11th April) & on Easter Saturday & Sunday, the Game Fishing Club of Northern Tasmania will be conducting the Sixth Tasmanian Open Game Fishing Contest. A large entry is expected. Surf Fishing has been poor since Christmas & one is not amused when the Angling writer of another Northern news-paper states that the beach fishermen are taking their best catches for years. He is a well known fresh water angler but it would appear that his knowledge of salt water fishing is restricted to that well known postage stamp. Entry forms for the Tasmanian Open Surf Angling Championships to be held at Swincart Beach on 1/2nd May are now available & entries should reach the Secretary of the St. Helens Club by 24th April. If you need some practice, Seamander Angling Club have a contest on Good Friday at Wrinklers from 3 - 9pm. Before these contests, perhaps it would be good for us to consider our attitude to fishing & read this extract from an article from the Big Game & Rod Fishers Association written in 1937. "As one grows older in fishing, even as one grows older in living, there comes the same consoling truth - that one need not catch big fish in order to be happy; that the spirit of fishing is more important than the size of the catch; that he who fishes well must fish with a calm and tranquil soul, drawing his reward from the joy of his fishing rather than from the weight of his fish. What if you don't catch a big fish or make a big catch of fish - you still have enriched your life with sunshine, fresh air, sparkling water and the tranquil peace of the out-doors."

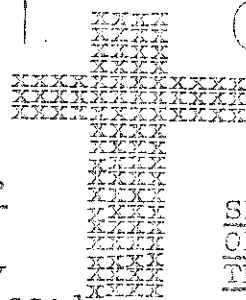

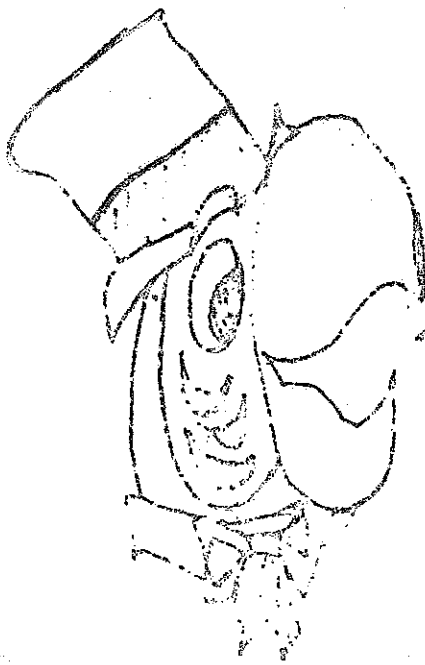
